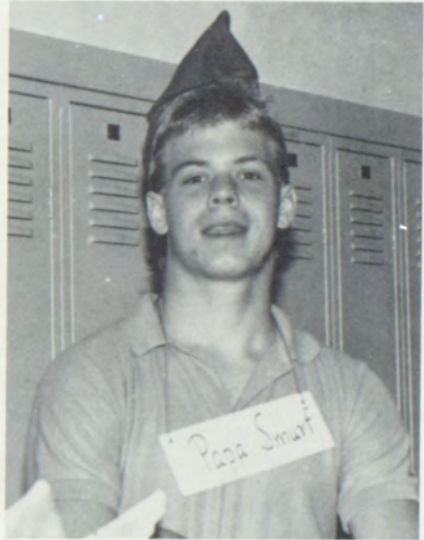
Juniors, feeling the "newness" of being upperclassmen for the first time, worked all the foot-

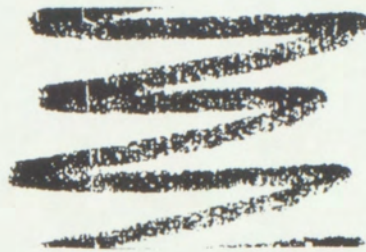

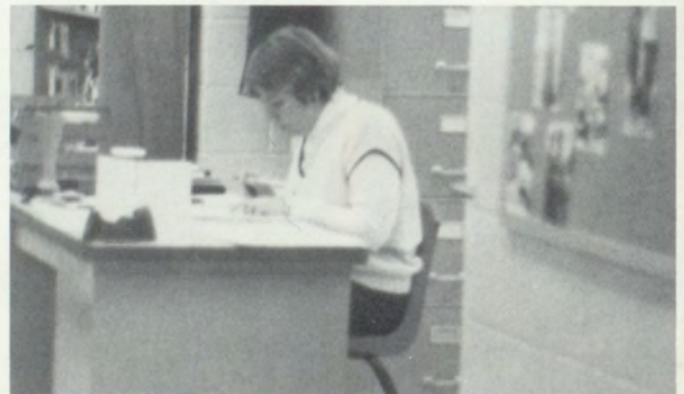

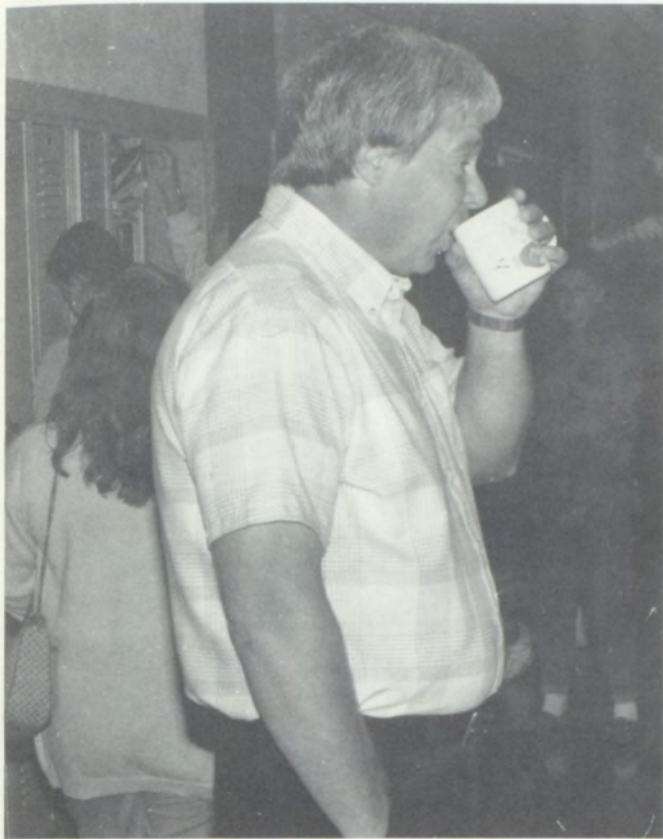

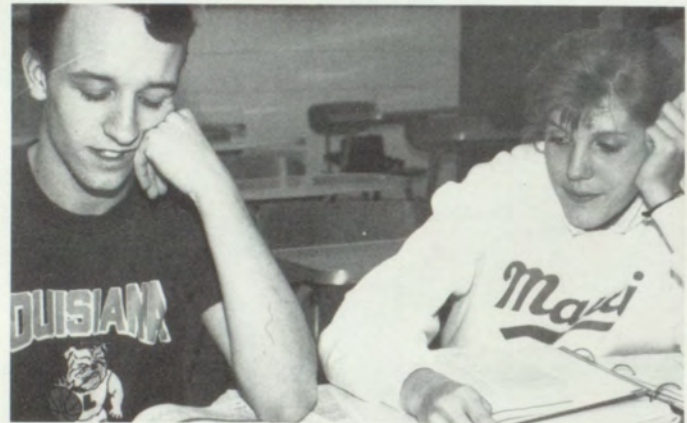

As if all that wasn't already a bundle of money, there were still announcements, name cards, and thank you notes to be purchased.

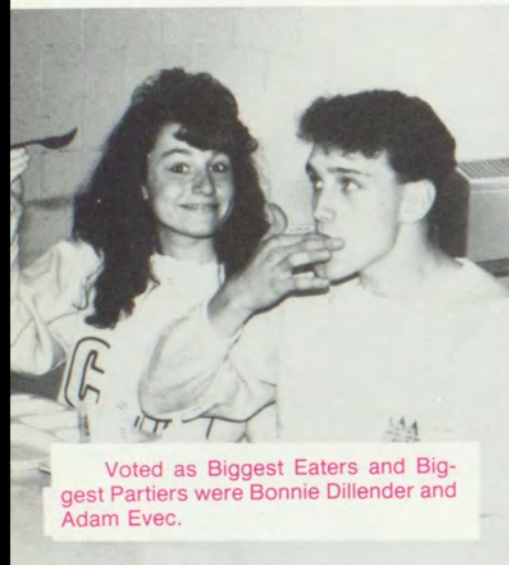
Don't forget, either, that you've been paying class dues for three years. At least your senior class dues go toward cap and gown rental fees.

Cast members also made many public appearances to advertise the production, including interviewing for the newspaper and the radio.

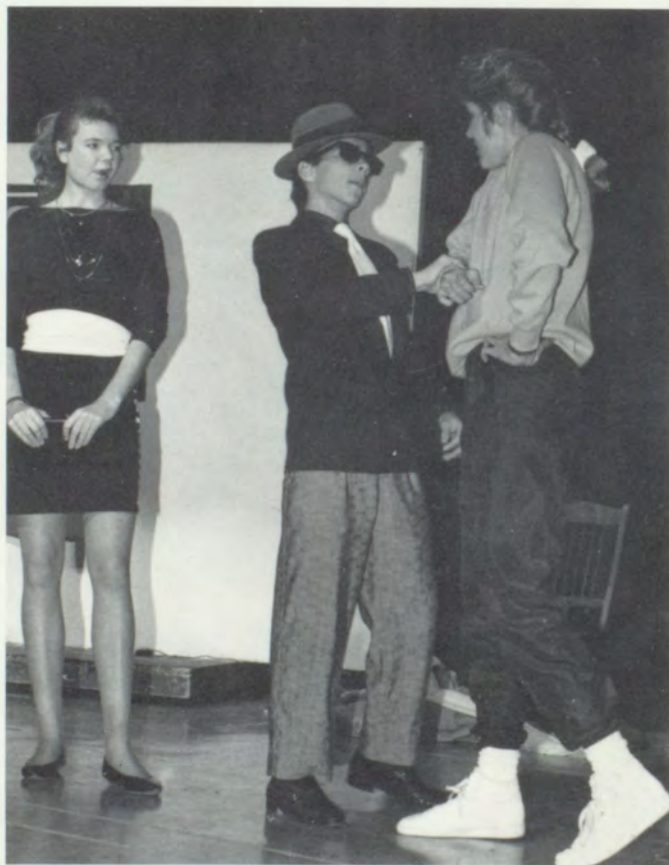
All of the cast members agreed that the play was a lot of fun and their hard work paid off.

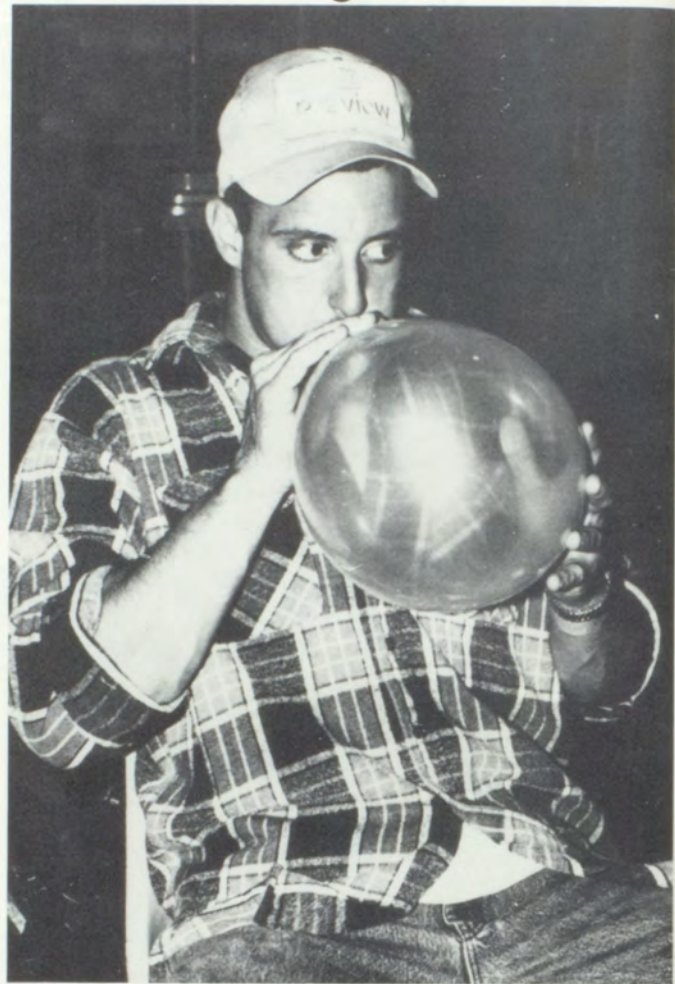

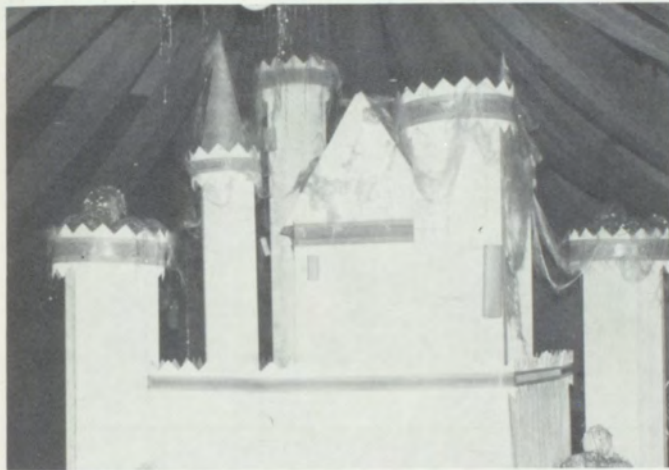

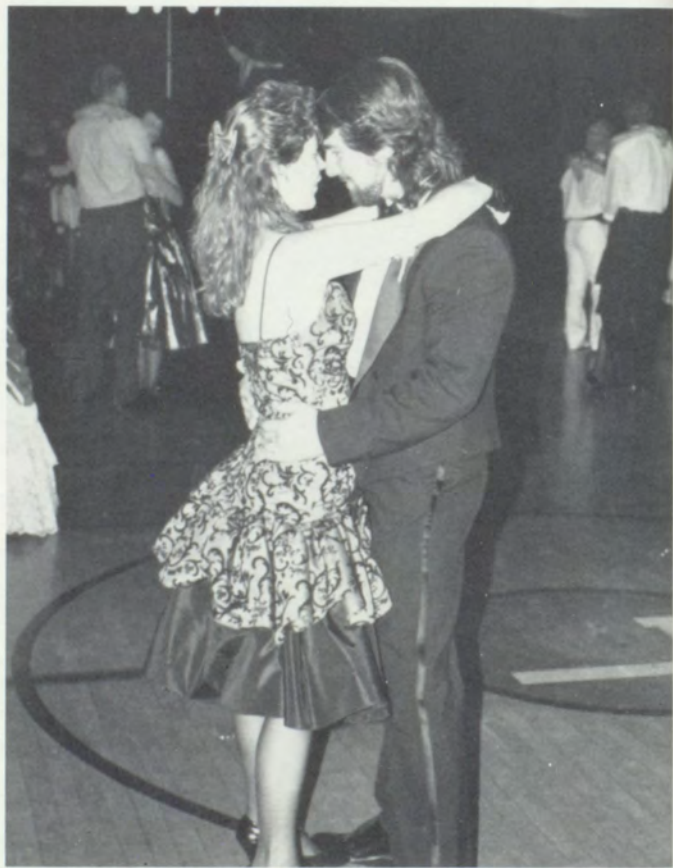

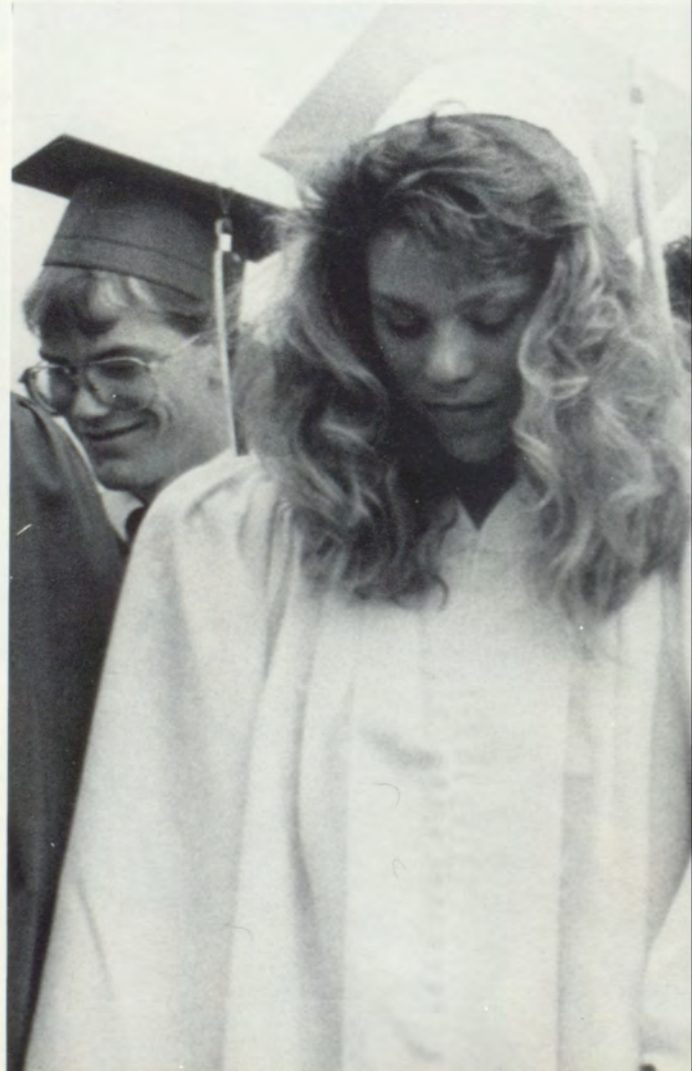

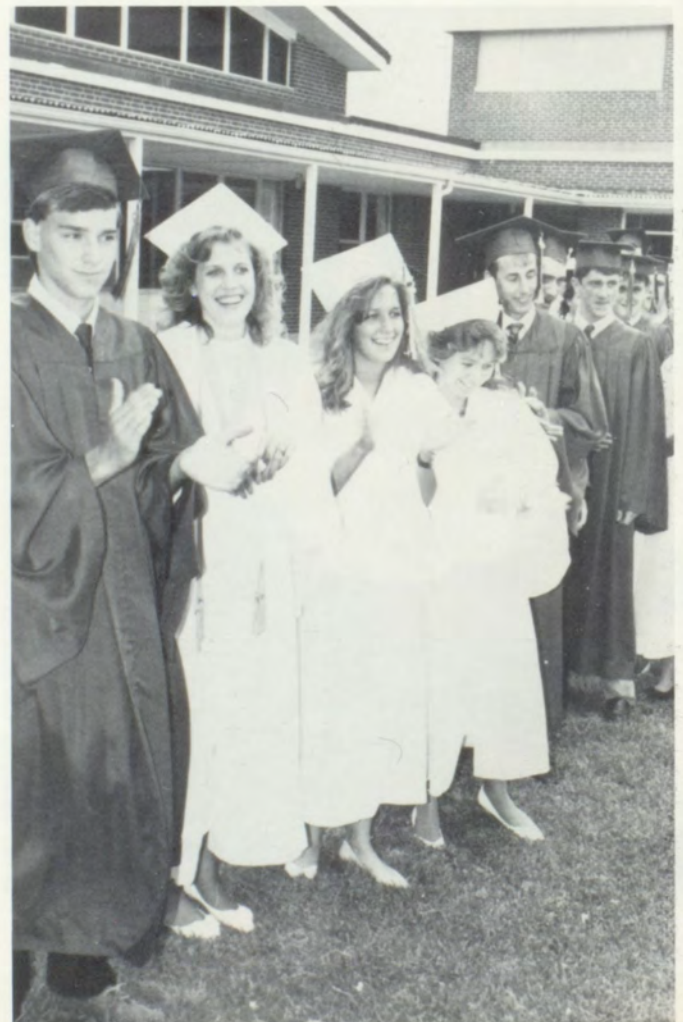

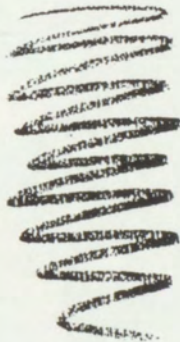

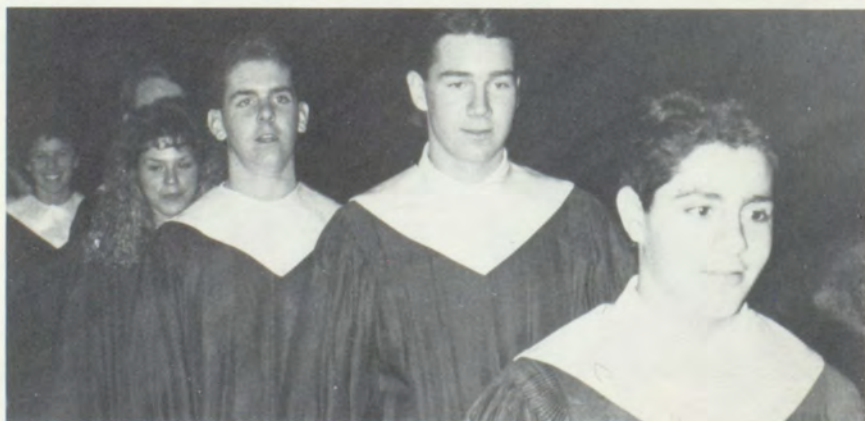

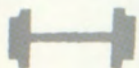

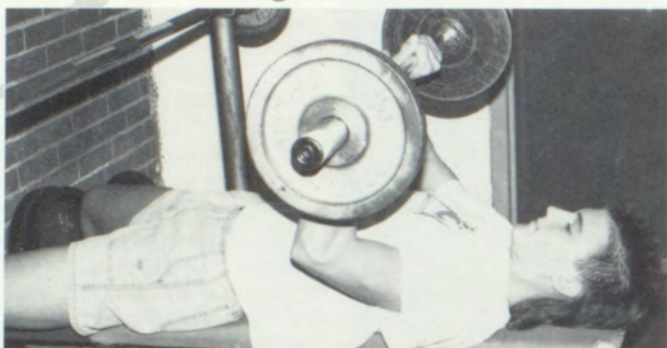

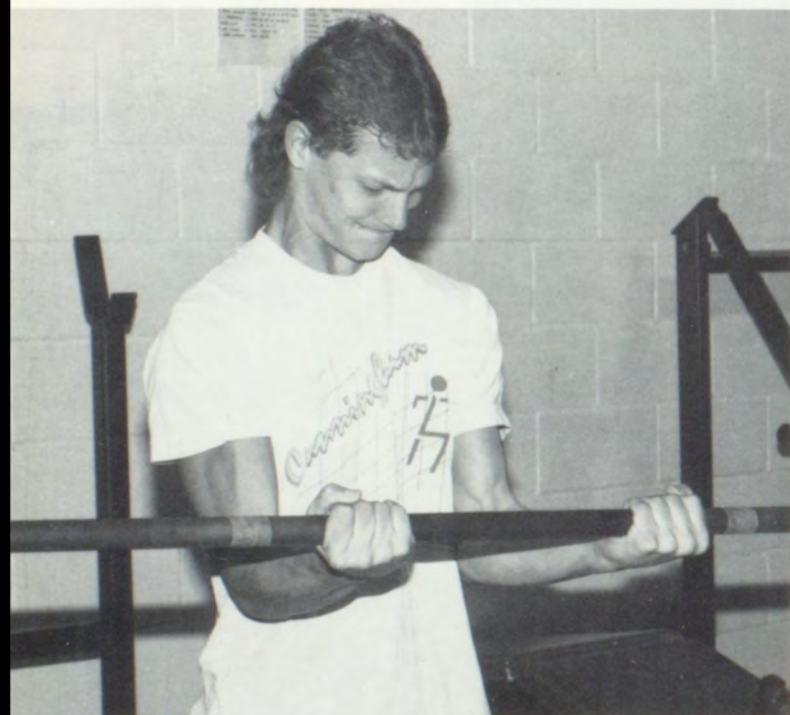

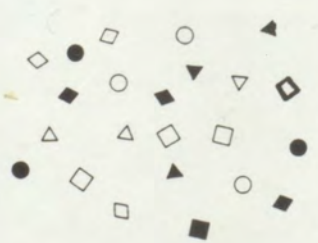

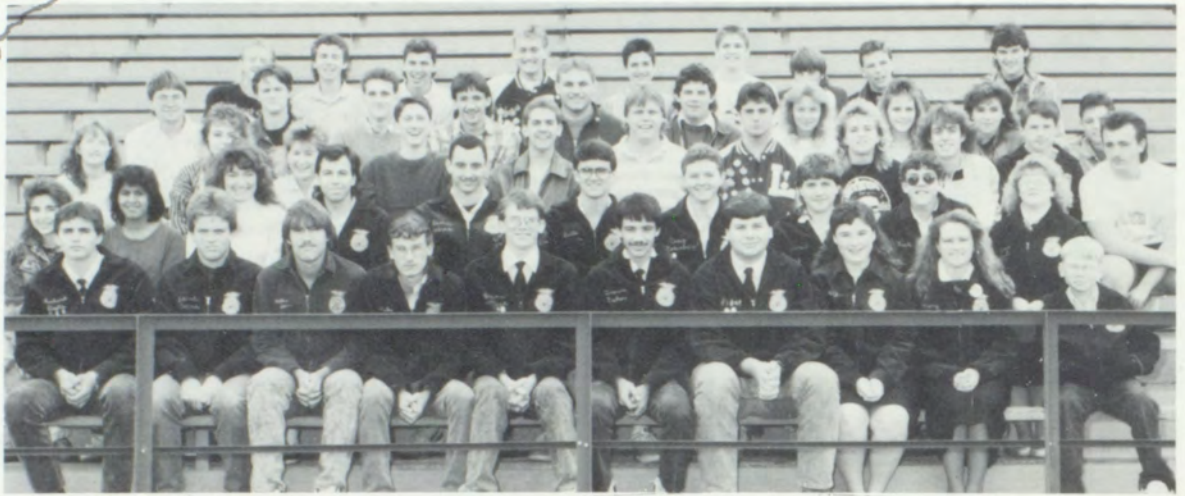

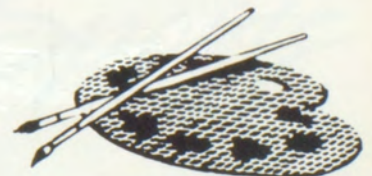

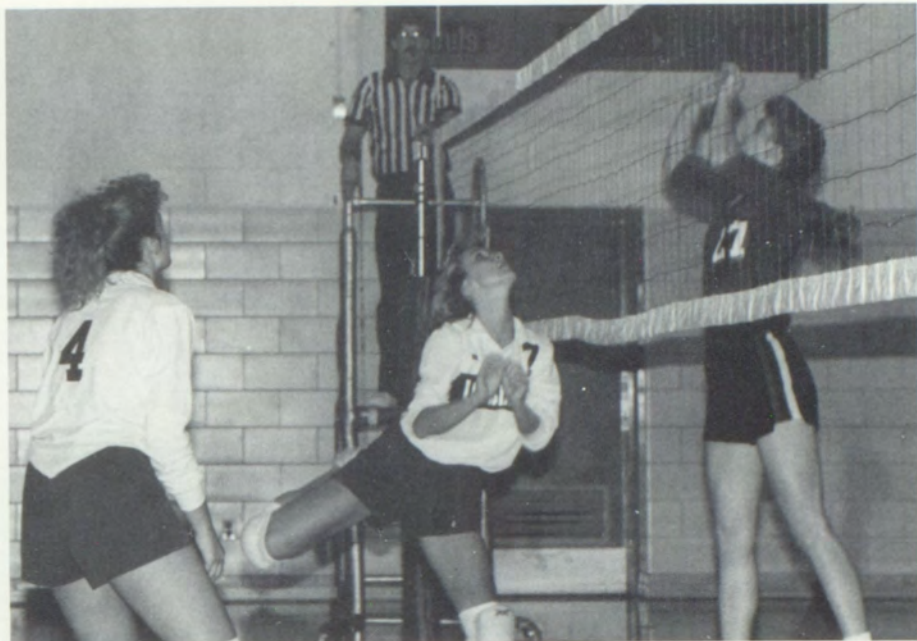
The JV squad had a record of 3 wins and 15 losses, but showed great enthusiasm for next year.

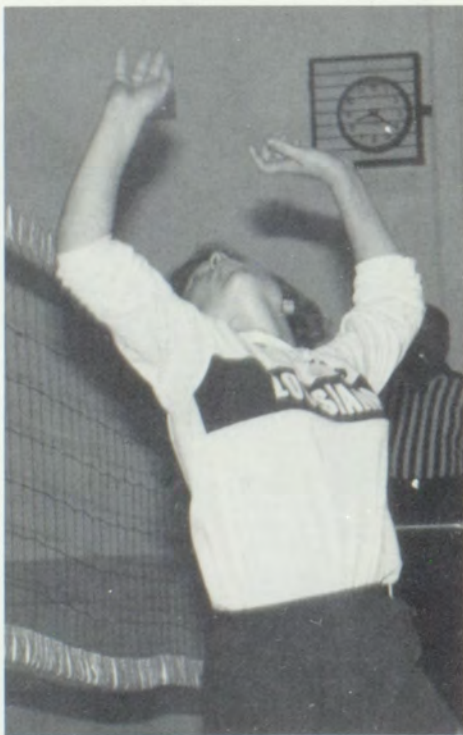

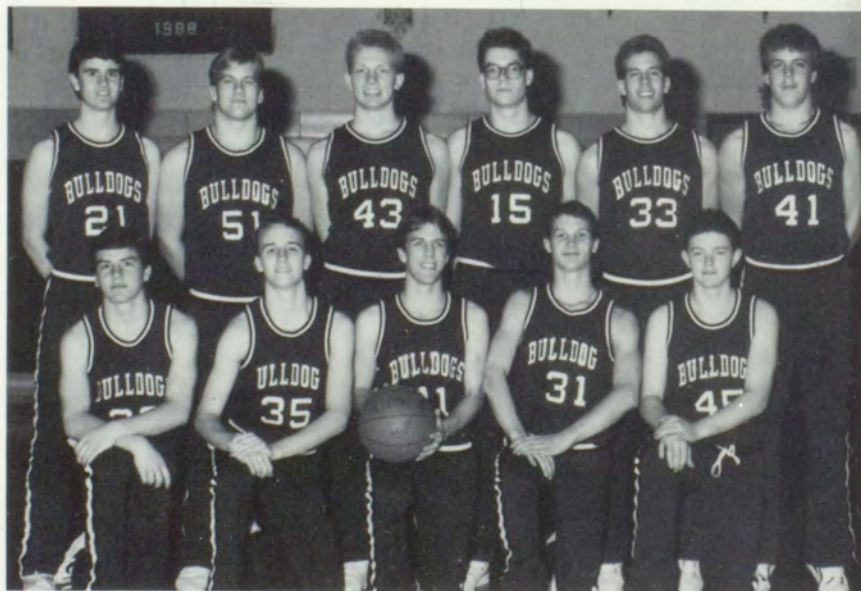

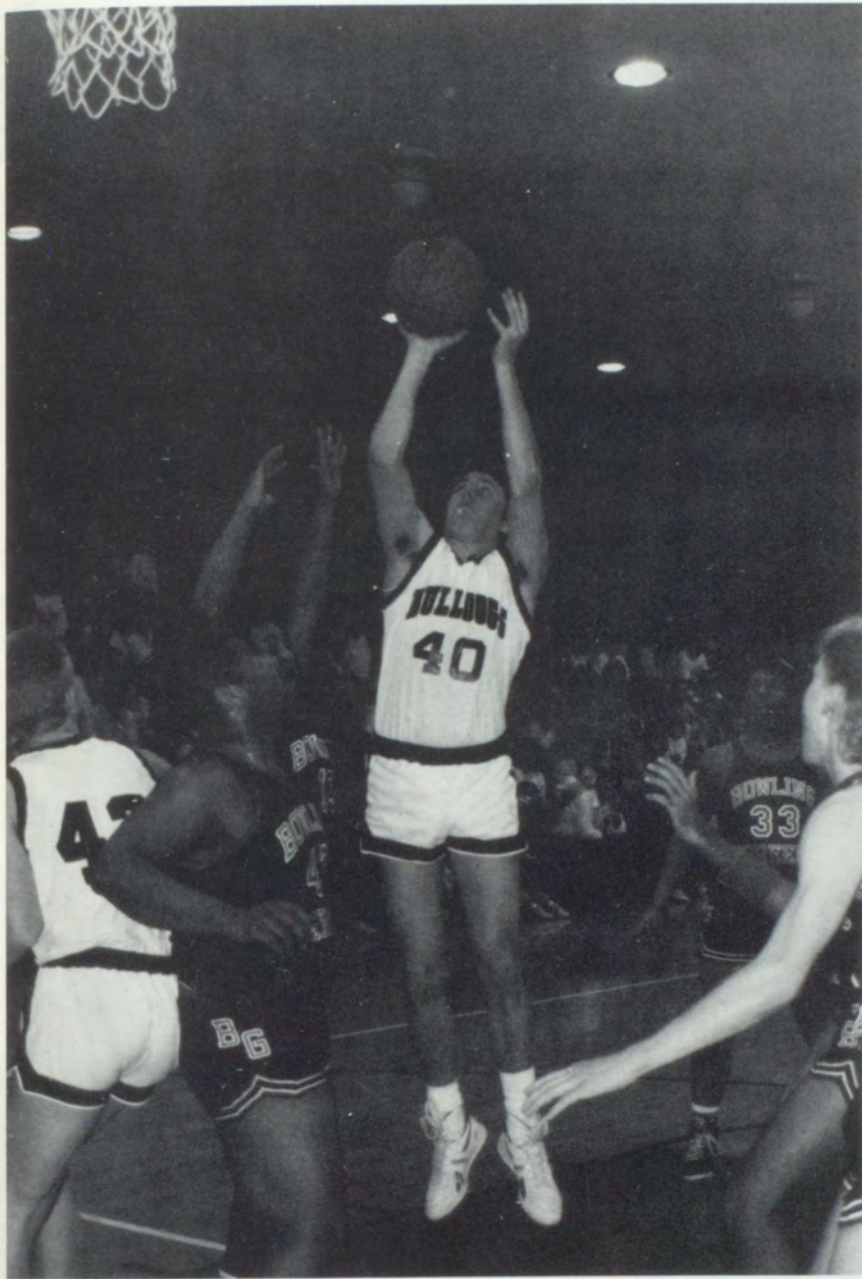


Dennis Griffith calls out a play as he looks intently to throw the ball in bounds.

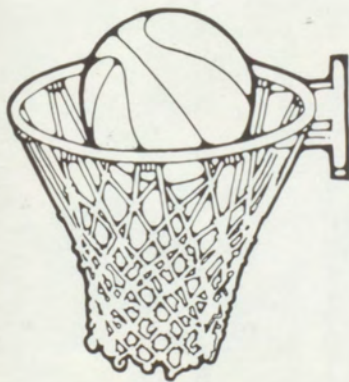

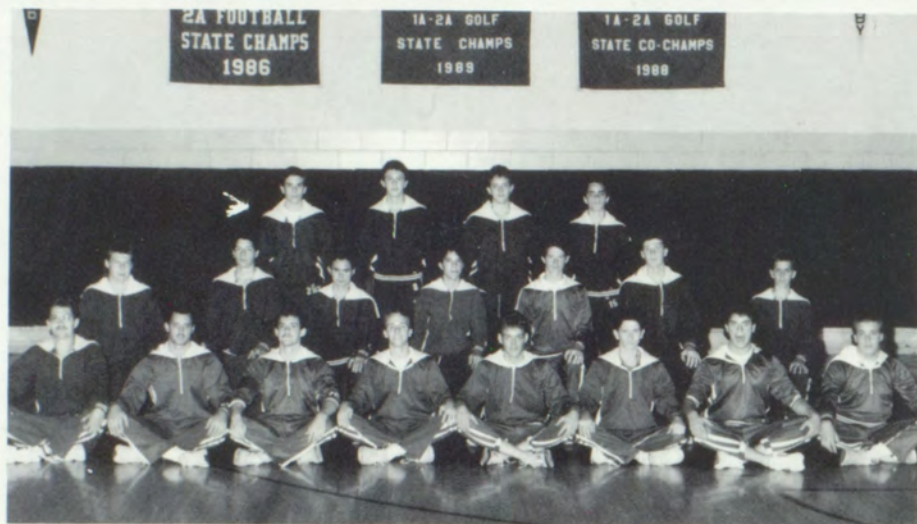
