1990-'91 had it all!

Heat, bond issue, war, Mickey Mouse . . .

Any way you look at it, 1990-'91 was a unique year at LHS. The "1991" itself is a palindrome, a "word, verse, or sentence which reads the same forward or backward." (**Webster's**) The last palindrome occurred in 1881. The next will occur in 11 years - 2002 - and then again every 110 years. We should have known immediately that the year was going to be something else . . .

At the beginning of the year, to say it was "hot" was one thing, but from a classroom point of view, it was an understatement.

The days started off warm and quickly rose to a heat index of 110°. As students sat at their desks, sweat dripping from their brows, their minds wandered to thoughts of air-conditioning and swimming pools. Although most rooms limited lighting and had two fans, it wasn't enough.

While many students found the heat unbearable, most were willing to continue going in the heat rather than make it up

later.

Despite the hot weather, we knew school was in progress with the "kick off" of the football game between Louisiana and Bowling Green. Only once in over 20 years have the Bobcats been victorious. This year's Bulldog team kept up the winning tradition by downing Bowling Green 27-6.

The year was also marked by several attempts to pass a \$3.725 million school bond issue. It was defeated in the April '90, November '90, and April '91 elections.

The issue was to finance additional classrooms at Primary, as well as close in existing classrooms. It also included additions at the high school: a 14-room and office area addition, the expansion of the library, and the addition of two special needs classrooms.

In the April '91 election, the bond received 46%, 11% below the needed majority. Superintendent Monachino was quoted in the **Press Journal** as saying, "It's terribly disappointing, but like anything else, we are going to have to look at all our options and see what the Board wants to do now."

The Board was continuing

study at the end of the year.

When Iraq, under the leadership of Saddam Hussein, invaded its tiny neighbor Kuwait in early August, the repercussions were felt around the world. America and her allies quickly moved into the region to begin Operation Desert Shield.

At home the crisis was felt not only at the gas pump, but many also had relatives and friends stationed in the Midwest. Correspondence was possible, but a letter took one to three weeks.

With the bombing of Baghdad on January 16, Operation Desert Shield became Desert Storm. Many LHS organizations rallied to show support for the troops and their families. FHA decorated the school with red, white, and blue ribbons, making the halls come alive with patriotism. FFA made wooden plaques inscribed with each soldier's name and presented them to the families. NAHS sent care packages to each service man with items ranging from magazines to toothpaste to playing cards. Each box also contained a gigantic "valentine" signed by students, faculty, and friends. NHS displayed a banner in the

trophy case in honor of those serving in the Gulf Crisis.

All the support paid off. After 42 days of combat topped off by a 100-hour ground war, Hussein was defeated on February 27.

In June the Bulldog marching band went to Disneyworld in Florida, the culmination of year-long fundraising efforts by students and Music Boosters. The approximately \$23,000 raised enabled the band to spend June 5-10 on their trip. In Orlando they marched at Walt Disneyworld and participated in the All-American Music Festival, earning fifth place in both marching and concert competitions.

Yes . . . it was quite a year.

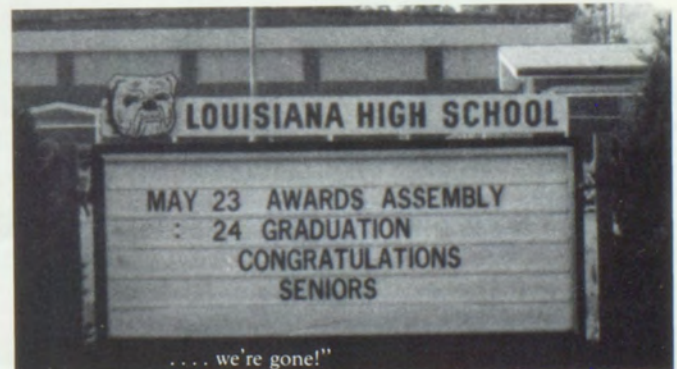
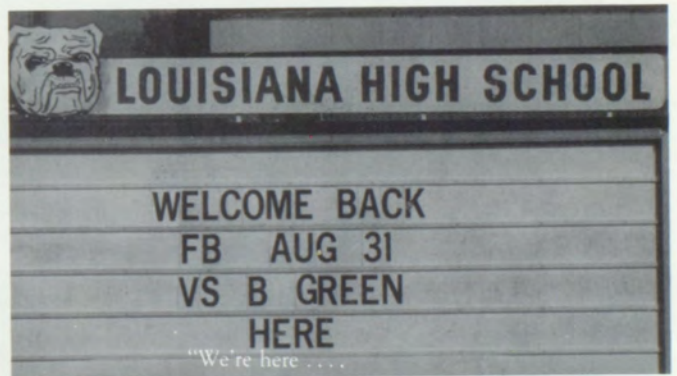

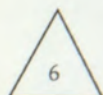

As severe as the California's Bay Area quake was on October 17, 1989, something potentially worse waits beneath Missouri and Illinois. Parts of the two states sit atop a geological time bomb known as the New Madrid Fault. The experts say a quake along that fault could spread damage over an area 20 times the size of a California quake.

Of the most severe quakes in the history of our continent, the hardest hit was the small town of New Madrid, Mo., located about 125 miles south of St. Louis. The shock waves in the 1812 quake were felt from Chicago to New Orleans and beyond. Entire forests were destroyed, the course of the Mississippi River was changed, and islands disappeared.

Iben Browning, a New Mexico climatologist, had projected a 50-50 chance for a New Madrid Fault quake measuring greater than 7 on the Richter scale on or about December 3, 1990. Browning based his theory on the sun and moon being aligned and closer to the earth than they have been in nearly 70 years. Although his prediction proved to be wrong, this day will probably always be remembered.

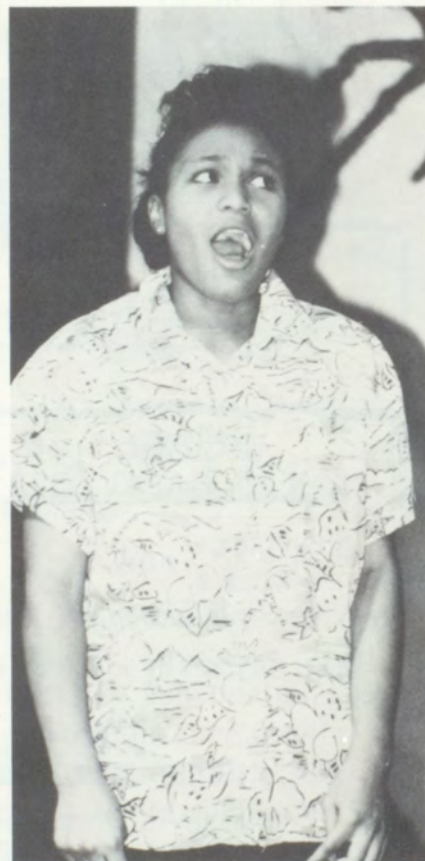

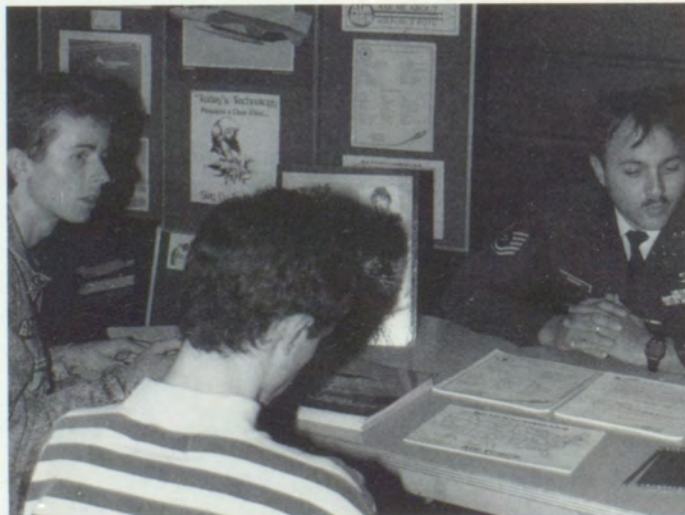

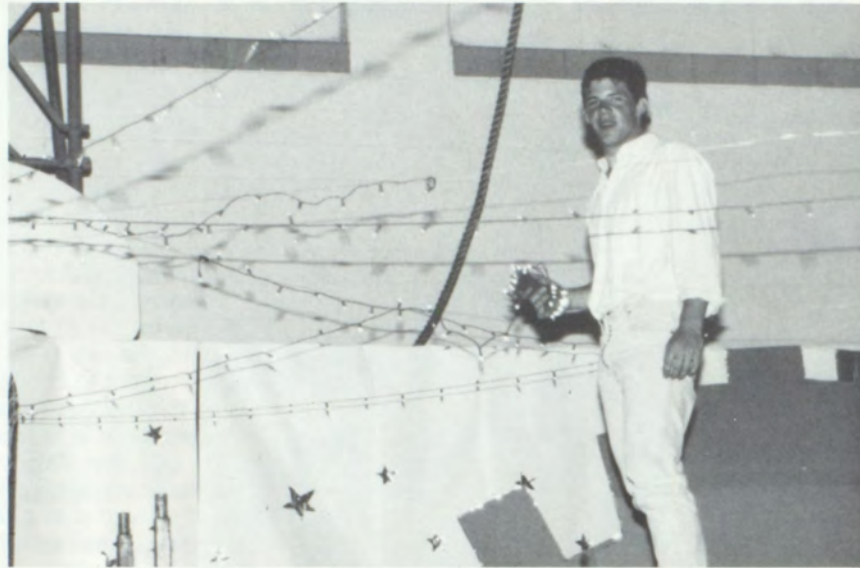
PROM 1991

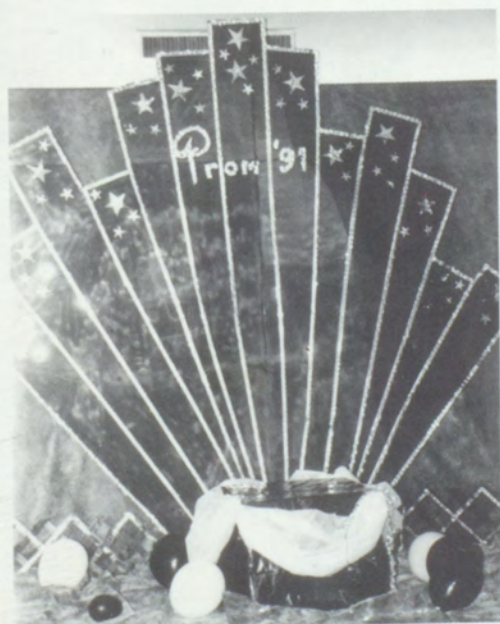

The exercises couldn't be held on the front lawn as they had in previous years due to soggy ground.

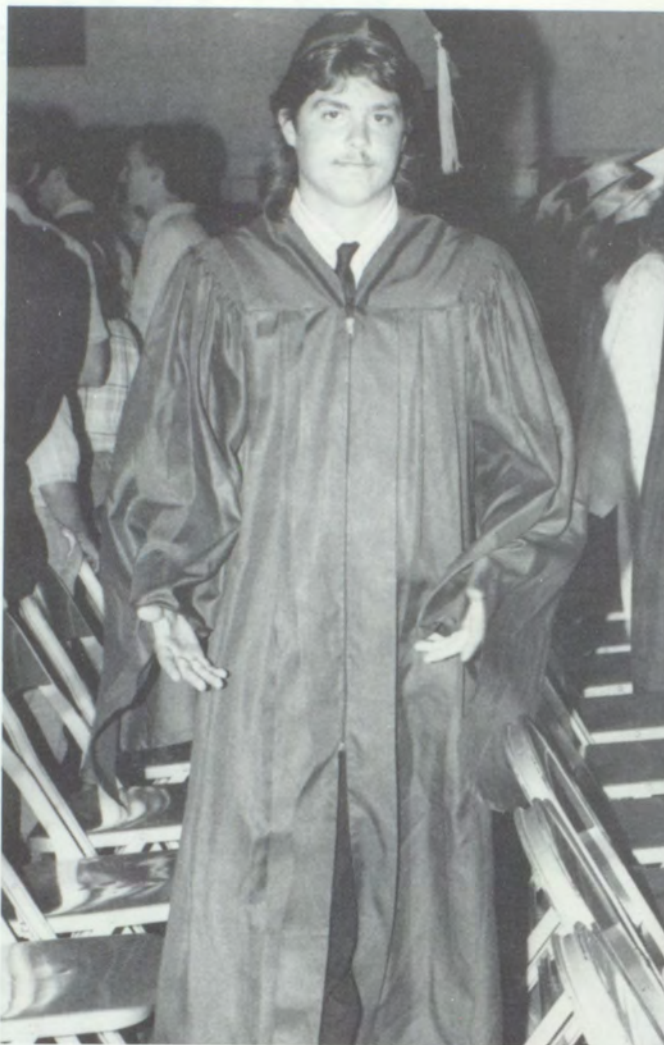
Following performances by the LHS choir and band, the highlighted speakers were valedictorian Erin Conklin and salutatorian Phyllis Sanders.

receive their diplomas from Board president Bill Wunderlich.

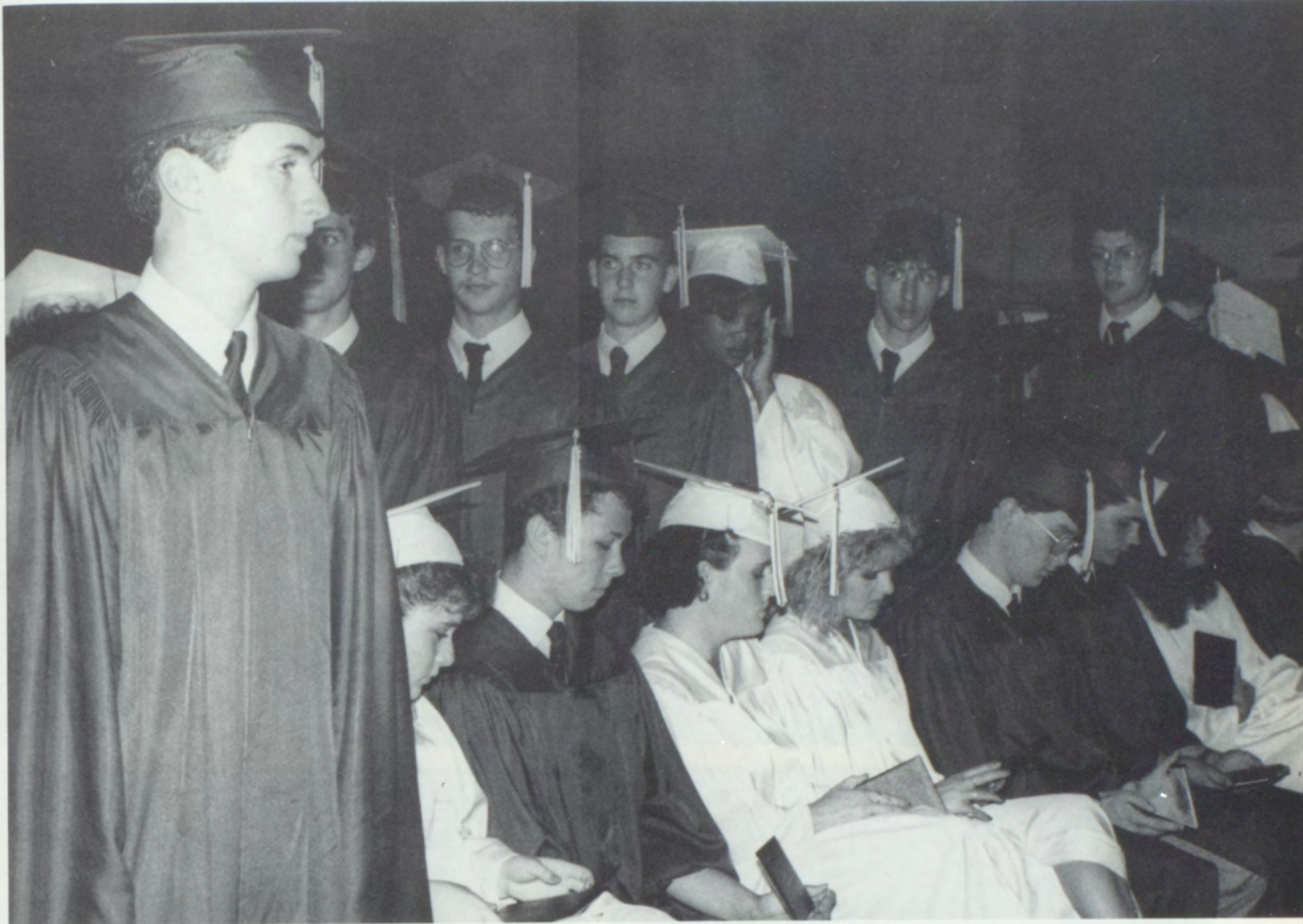

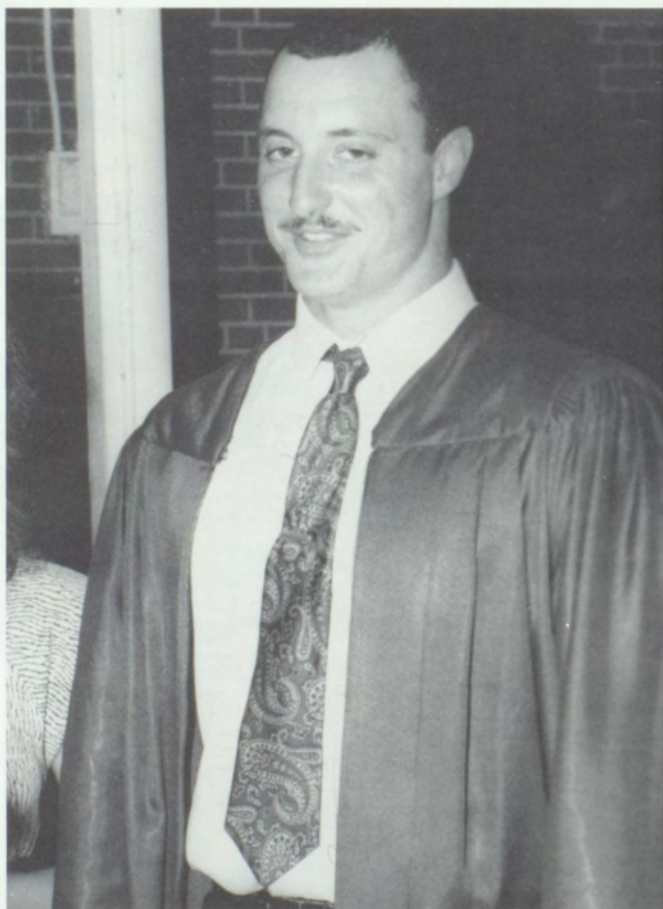

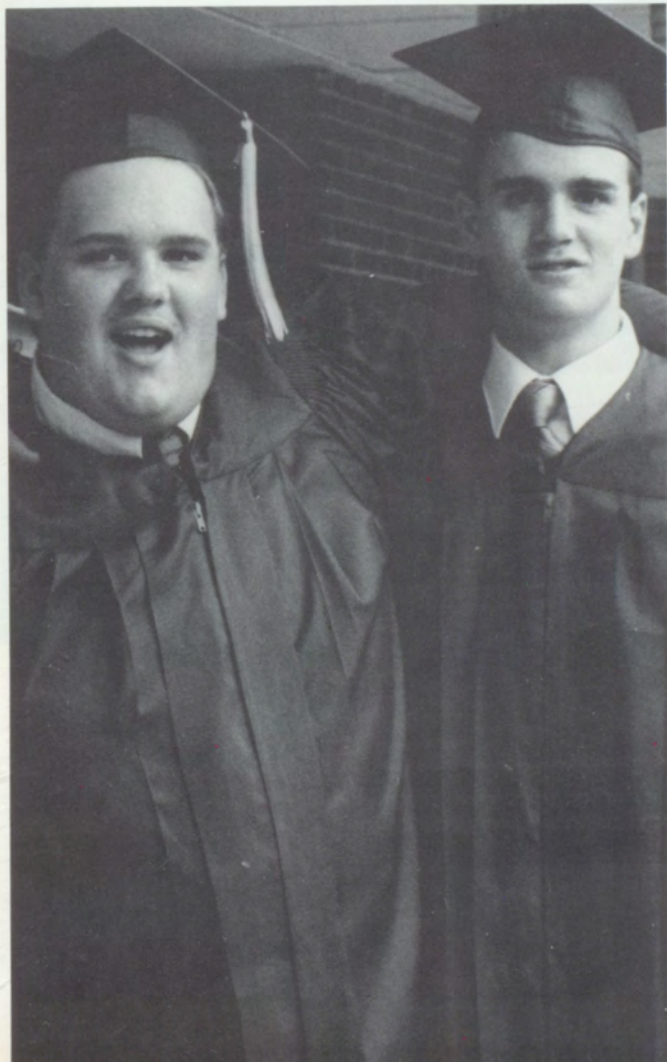

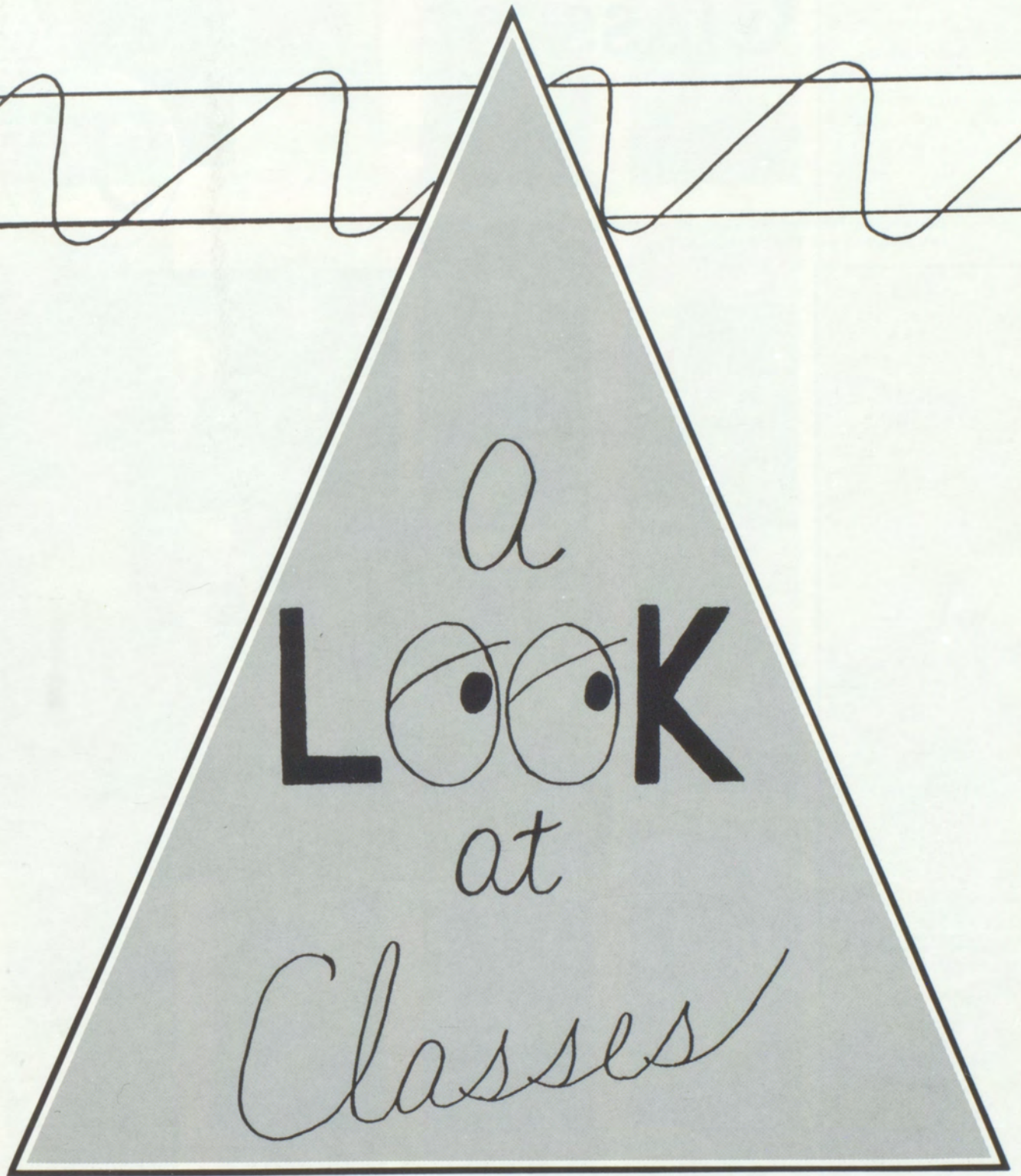

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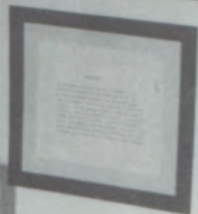

Some jobs are extensions of summer jobs.

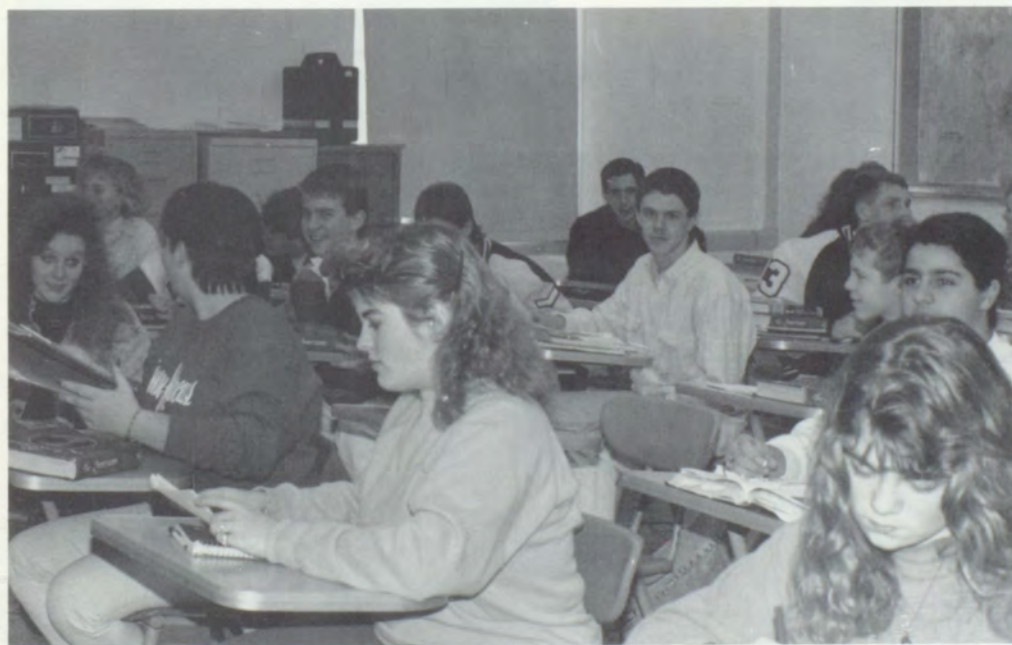
"I kept working after the summer so I could pay for my car and have money to keep it running," senior Chris Gray said. Chris is also employed at Hardee's.

Auto Body is also an enjoyable class.

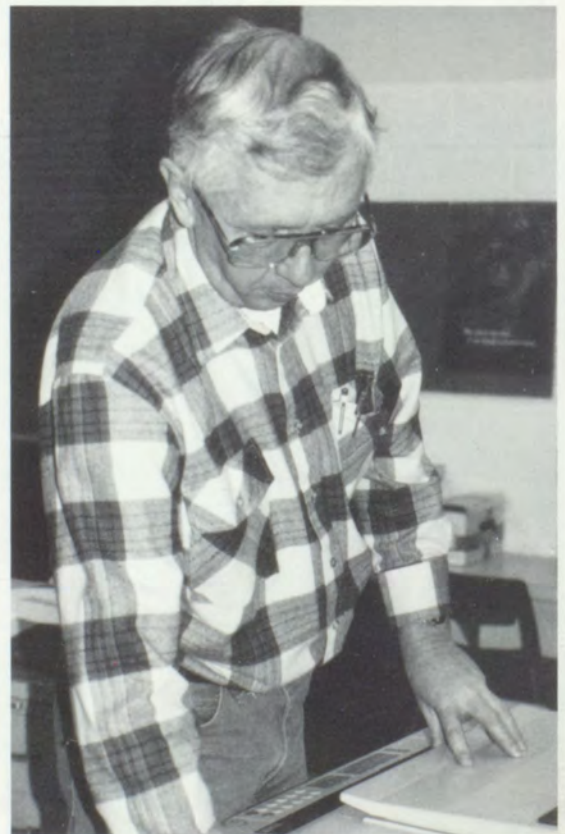
"In Auto Body they are teaching me how to take the dents out of a car," junior Nikki Seal said.

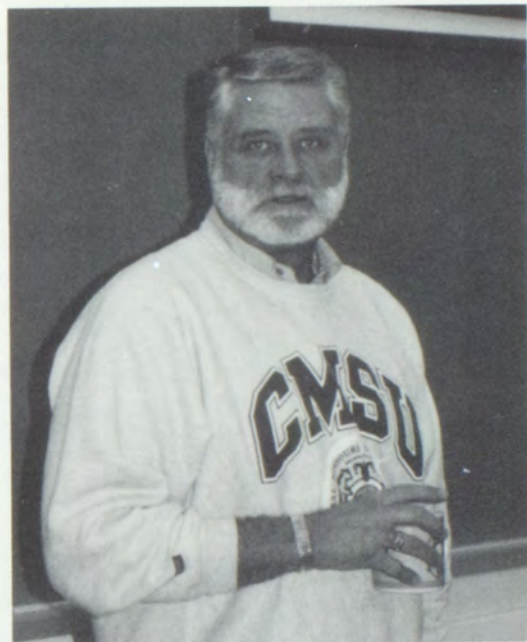

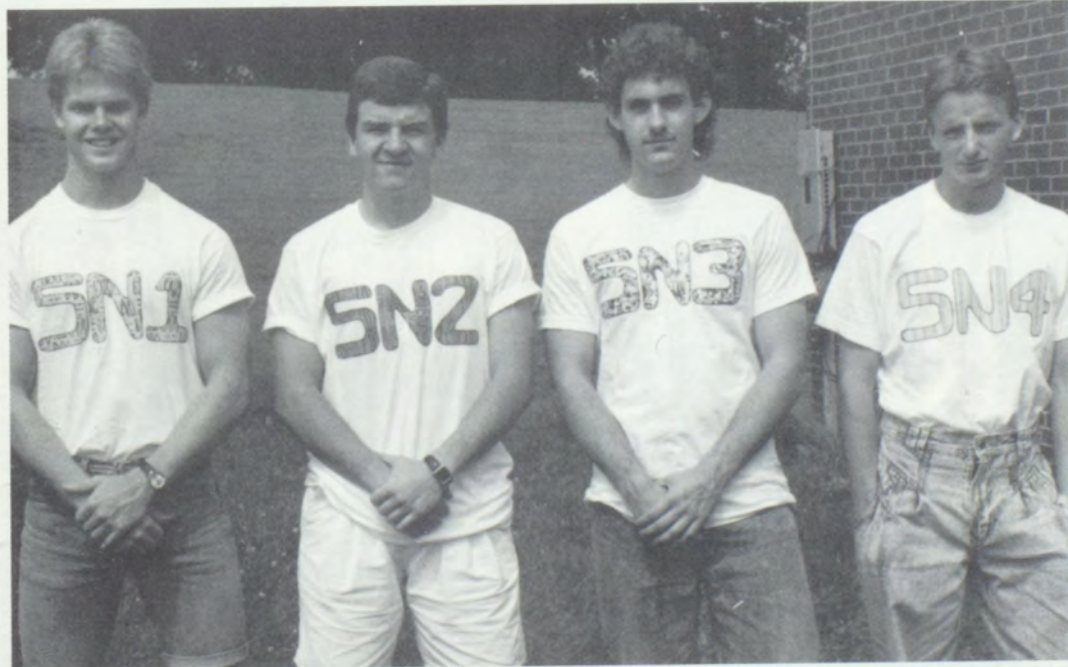

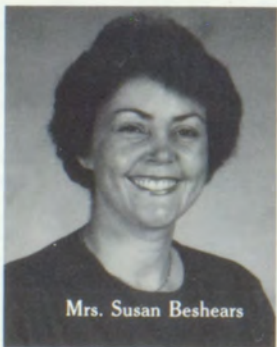
"They have very interesting games and great graphics and they are very good assets to the school," freshman Jeff Bell said.

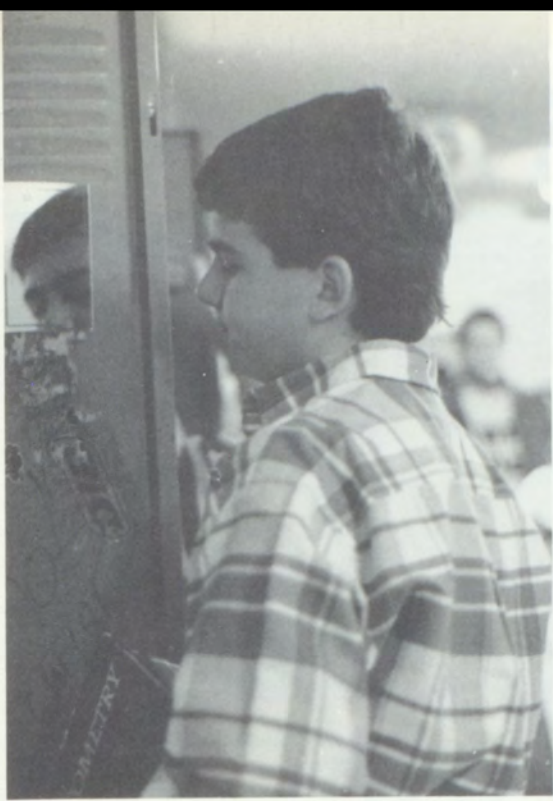

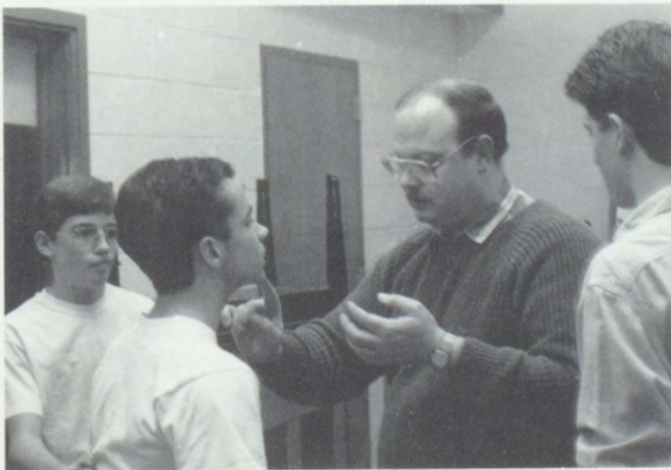

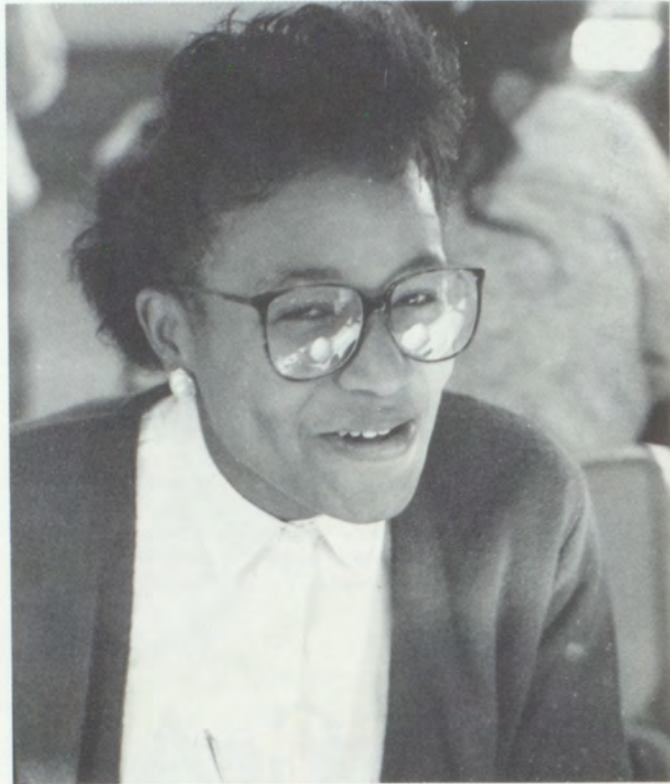

Junior Nick Key also attended the game in Blue Springs and was pleased with the team.

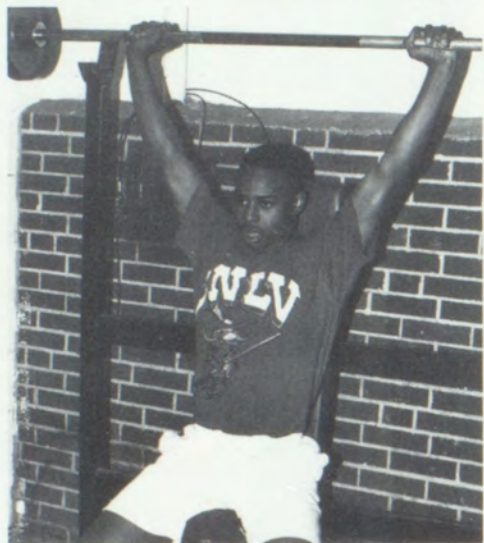
"The whole team played well in the final match, but Roger played a heck of a game," Nick said.

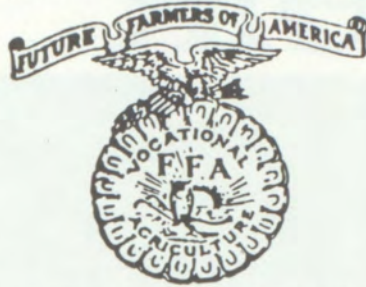
FFA Has Busy Year

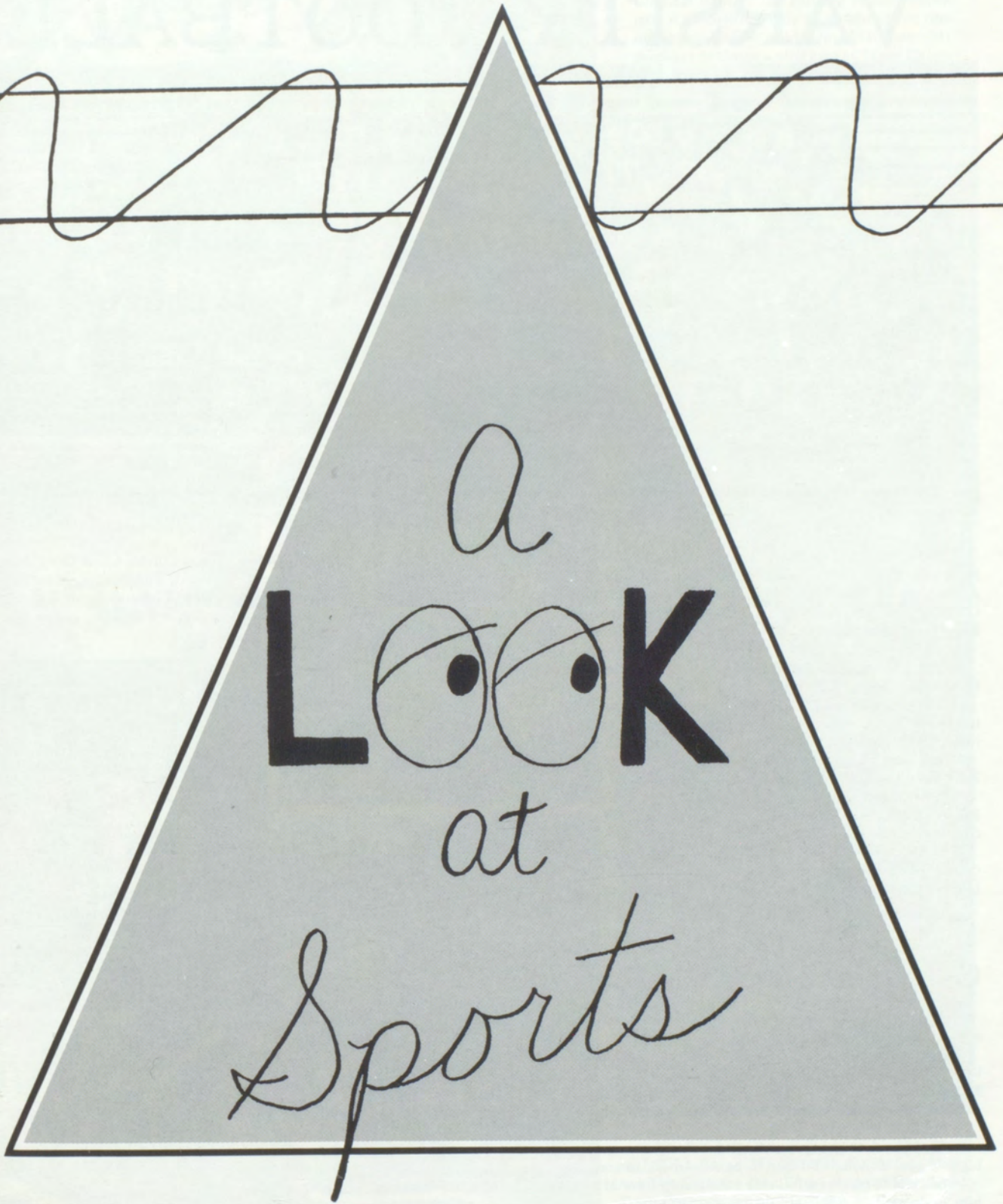

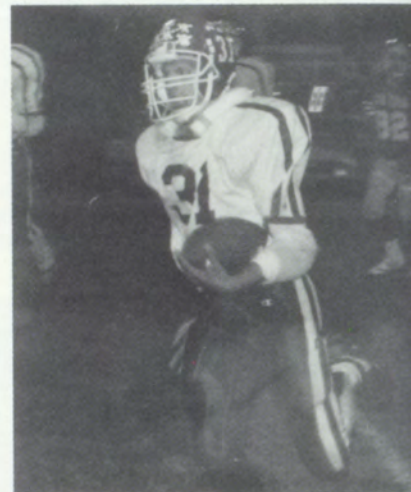

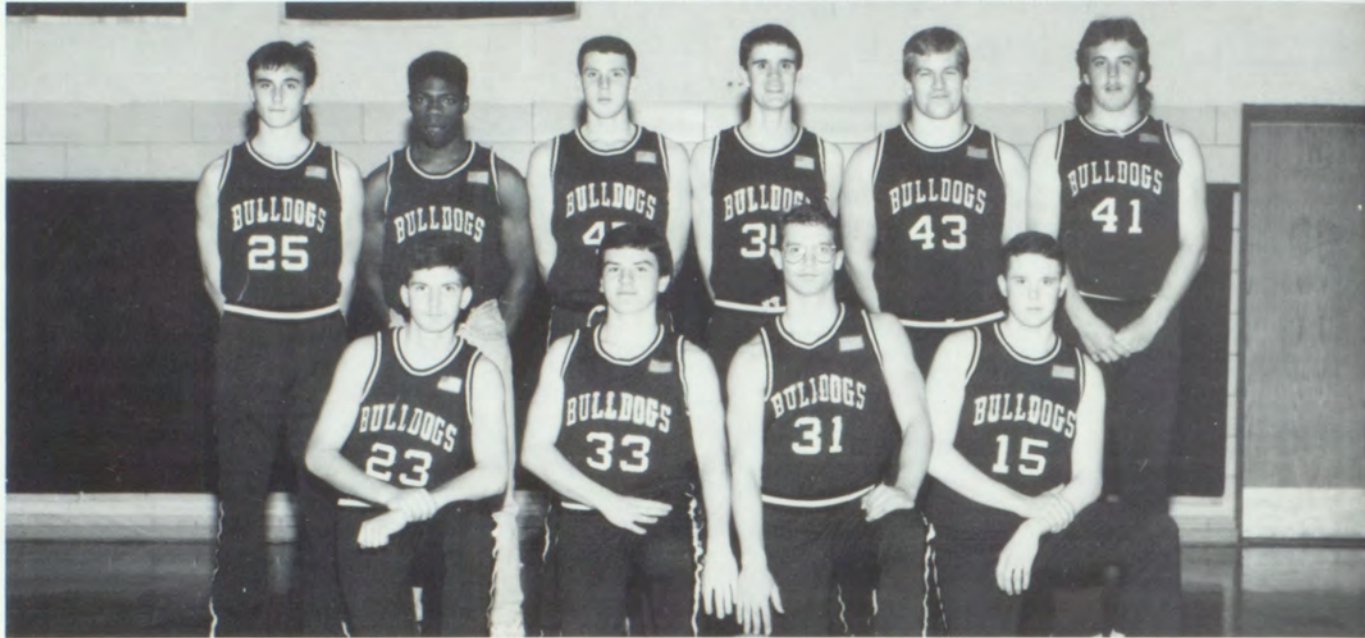

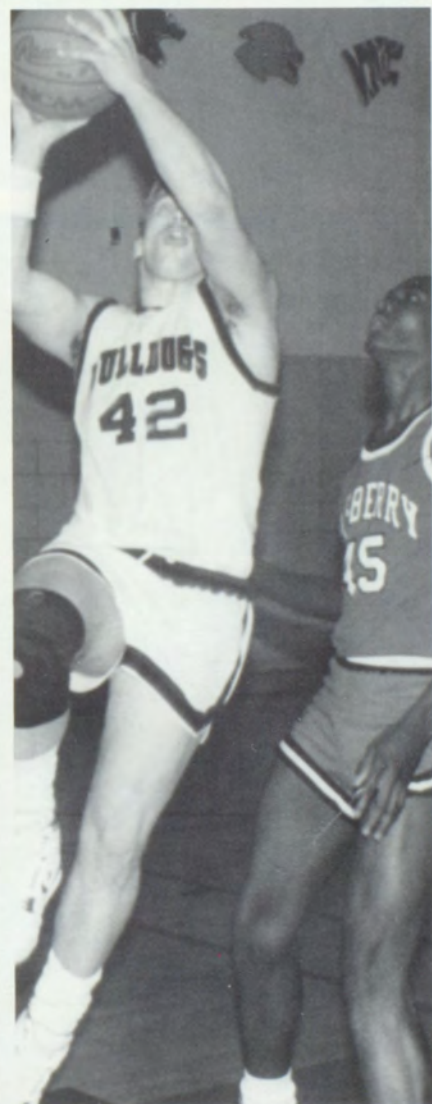
They finished the season 8-17, but they were a much better team than their record indicated.
