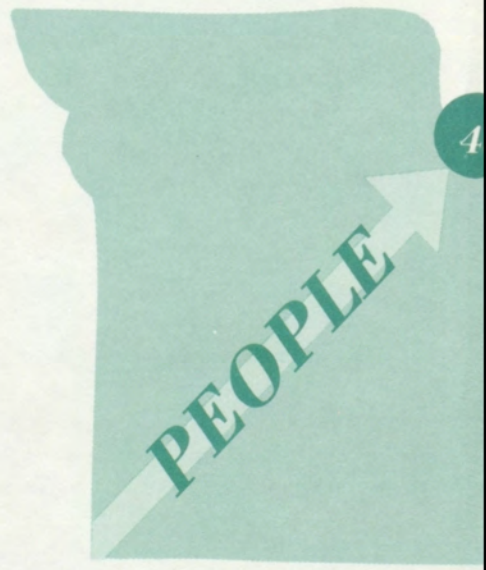
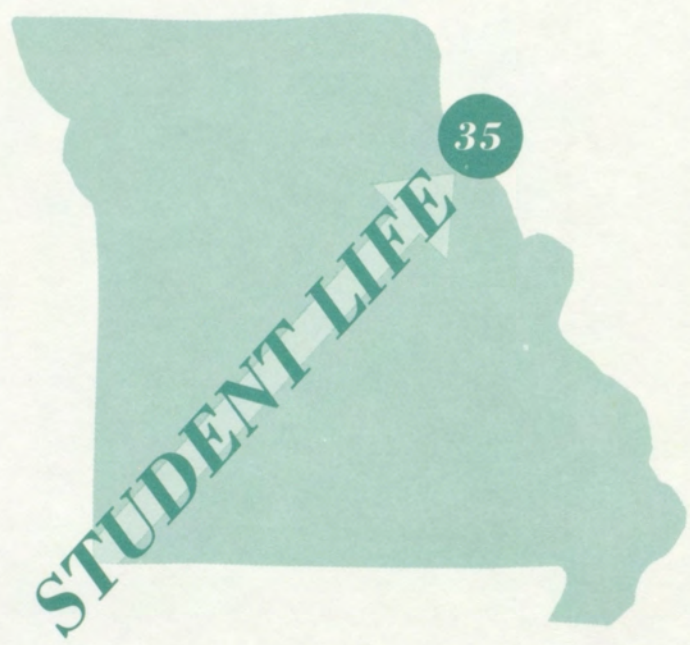

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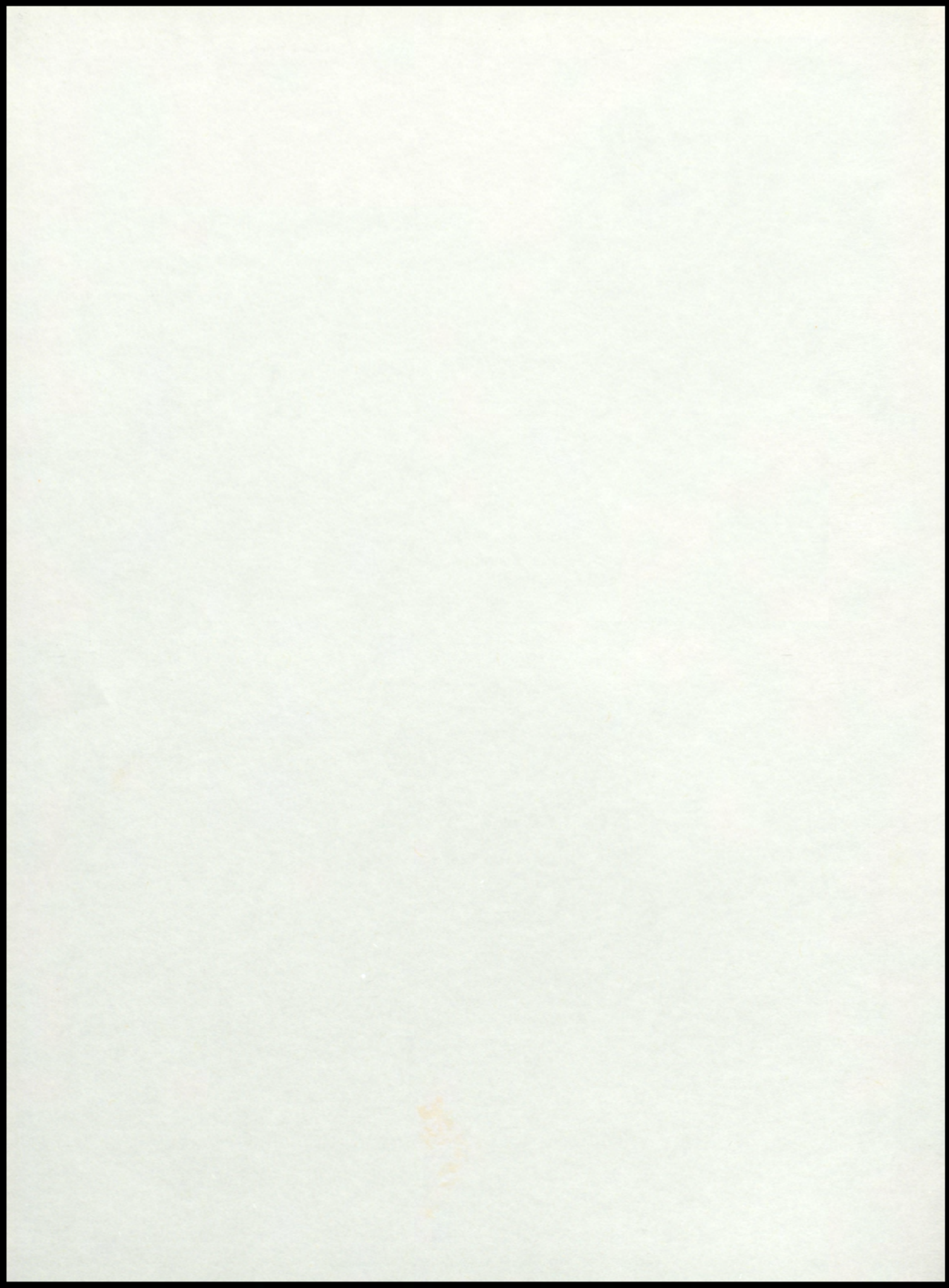

## 'It's All in the Name'

It was all in the name at Louisiana High School in 1992-'93. Everything fits together to make the name of something and this year was no exception. The name was everything.

At the annual cross-county rival football game, the 'Dawgs downed the Bowling Green Bobcats 20-13. It was the "name of the game" for the 'Dawgs to continue the 23-year-old winning tradition.

A new name "slid" into the sports curriculum this year when softball had its first season. Although few games were won, the girls' spirits never dragged, and everyone looked forward to playing next year.

Clothing brand names were hot items this year. Among them were Pepe, Guess, Z Cavaricci, and Polo, and they were evident everywhere.

It was name that tune when "Bye Bye Birdie" enchanted audiences in November. The play packed the gymnasium and delighted playgoers.

The National Honor Society made a new name for itself this year with the largest chapter in LHS history. Fourteen people were inducted on Nov. 5th.

The weather was the usual "Missouri weather," with no one knowing what to expect. It allowed for some unexpected vacations. Students loved hearing the name of our school being cancelled over the local radio. Snow days caused school closings to the extent that "Spring Break" was more like "Spring Pause," with Good Friday as our only day off.

Helping others was what FTA, STUCO, and Key Club had in mind as the groups participated in helping feed needy families at Christmas.

The face might have been gone, but the name still remained in our hearts as foreign exchange student Kate Curry traveled back to her home of Kaipoi, New Zealand, in early January.

New faces and new names entered the White House on January 20th. President Bill Clinton, wife Hillary, daughter Chelsea, and cat Socks moved in and started making changes.

Senior Nathan O'Donnell continued making a name for himself when he was selected for All-State Choir for the second consecutive year. The repeat selection was a first ever for an LHS musician.

In February, FHA made over \$80 selling "Sweetie Grams" for Valentine's Day. They also held a faculty "Sexy Lips" contest--Jesse Jackson and Cheryl Shaw were the winners.

When school district patrons were asked in April to approve a \$3.8 million bond issue to build a new high school and make additions to Primary, they said "YES," and the district started gearing up for lots of changes.

For the third year in a row, the choir received several "I" ratings at district and state levels. A new name joined that prestigious group when the Ladies Choir received a "I" rating for the first time.

In May, the juniors made a name for themselves by creating "A Night In the City." Both school and students took on a new look that night with elegant decorations and attire.

New names enter high school every year, but not every name will enter the record books. Freshman Kari Anderson's name was an exception this year. Kari broke the school's record for the 300-meter intermediate hurdles. The record had stood since since 1988 at 51.1 seconds, but Kari broke it with a time of 49.8 seconds.

Money was the name of the game on Thursday, May 27 at the annual awards assembly. Extended over a four-year period, nearly \$250,000 in scholarship monies were given out to graduating seniors.

The end of the year brought the loss of an important name at LHS...after 14 years as teacher and principal, Dennis Griffith left LHS to take an educational position in Jefferson City. We all wished him good luck.

The name of the game was "Bon Voyage" for eight LHS students and French instructor Sally Keithley as they took a whirlwind tour of several European countries in June.

Graduation was the highlight of the end of the school year and the beginning of a new life for the seniors. It was finally their job to go make a new name for themselves in the big world.

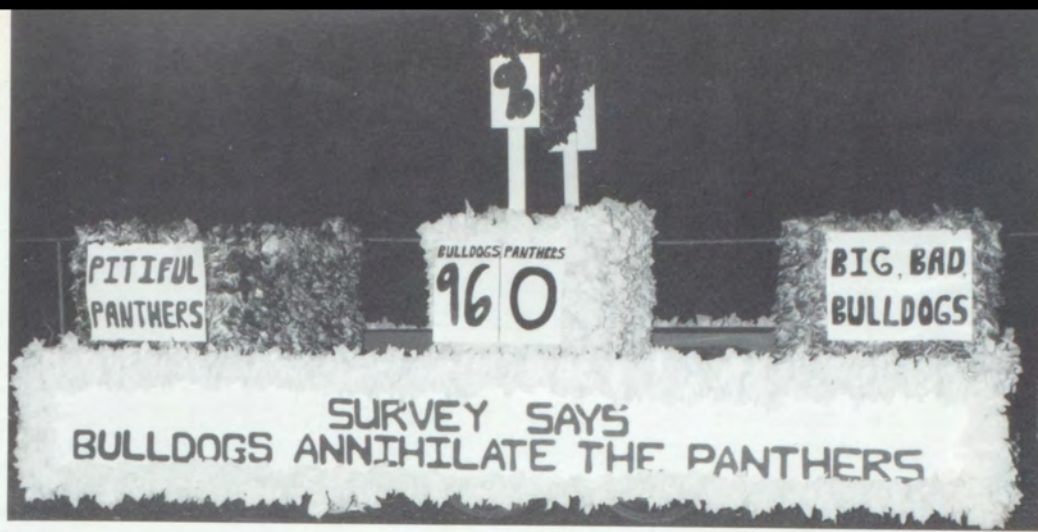

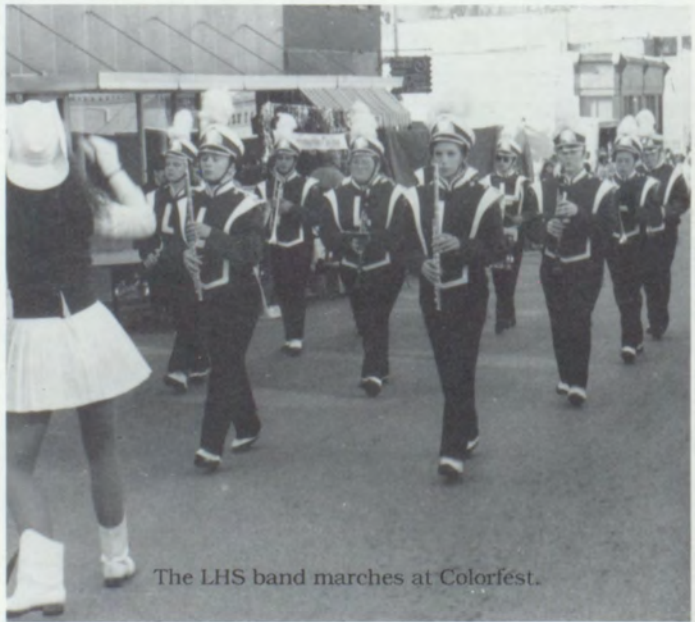

# COURTWARMING '93

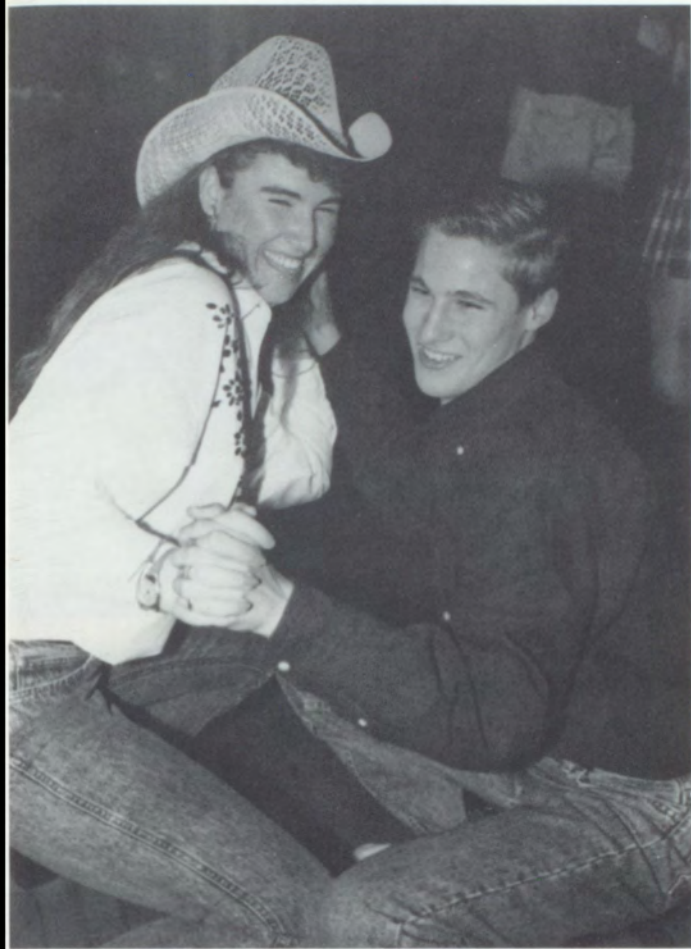

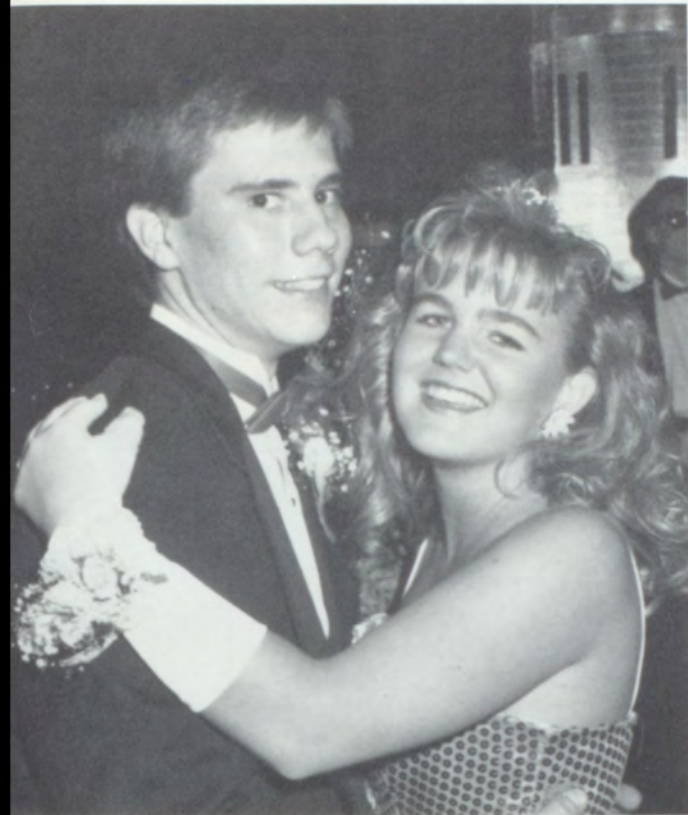

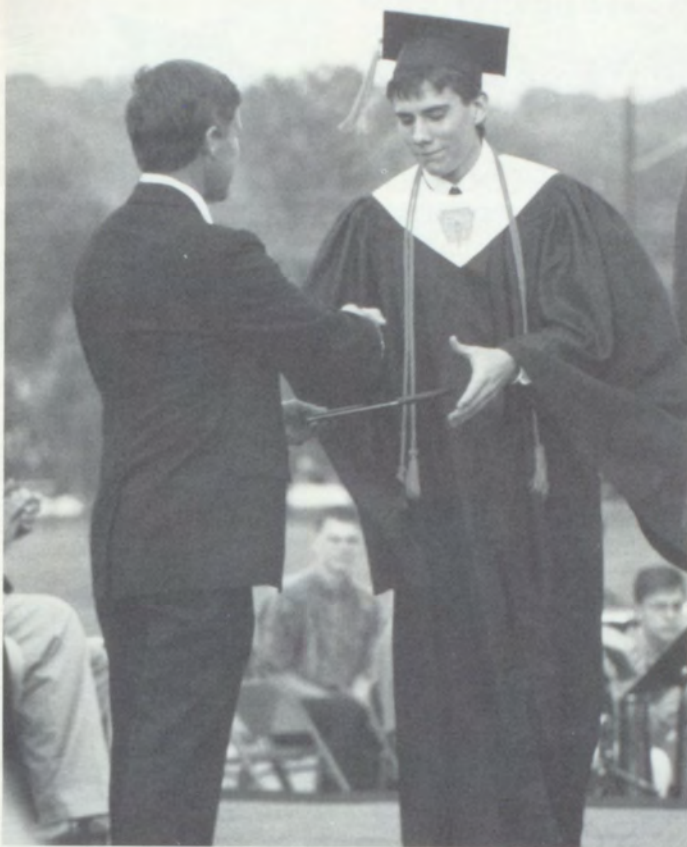
Diplomas were given out by Board of Education president Billy Sheppard. Twenty-one students were recognized for superior scholarship at the ceremonies.

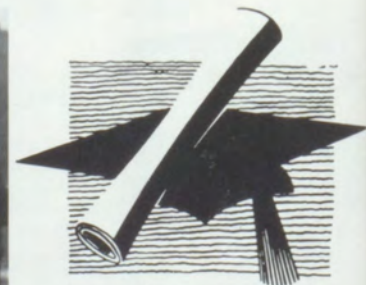

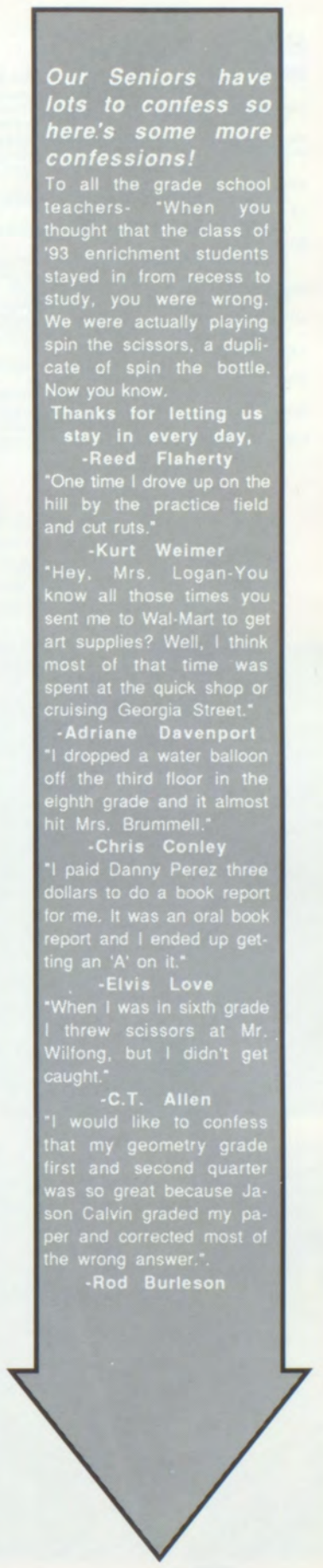

"I felt proud because I got to do something the little kids would enjoy," she said.

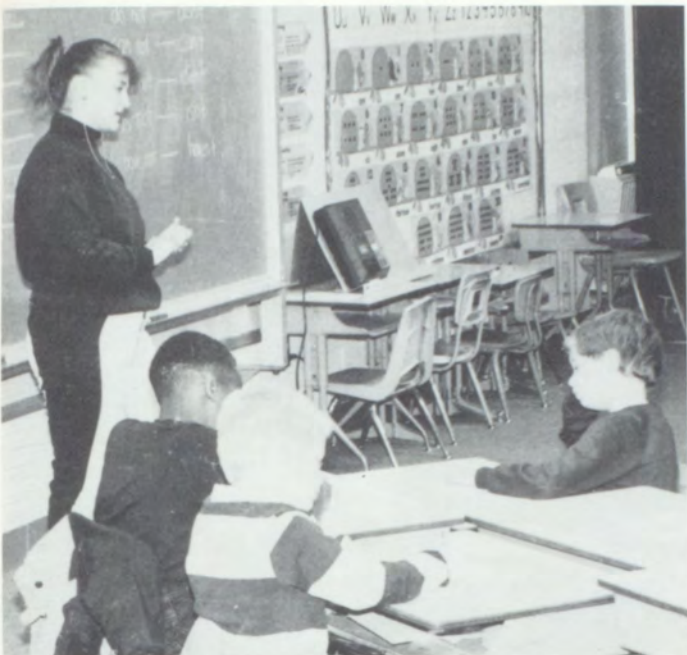
Not all students felt the kids enjoyed the stories.

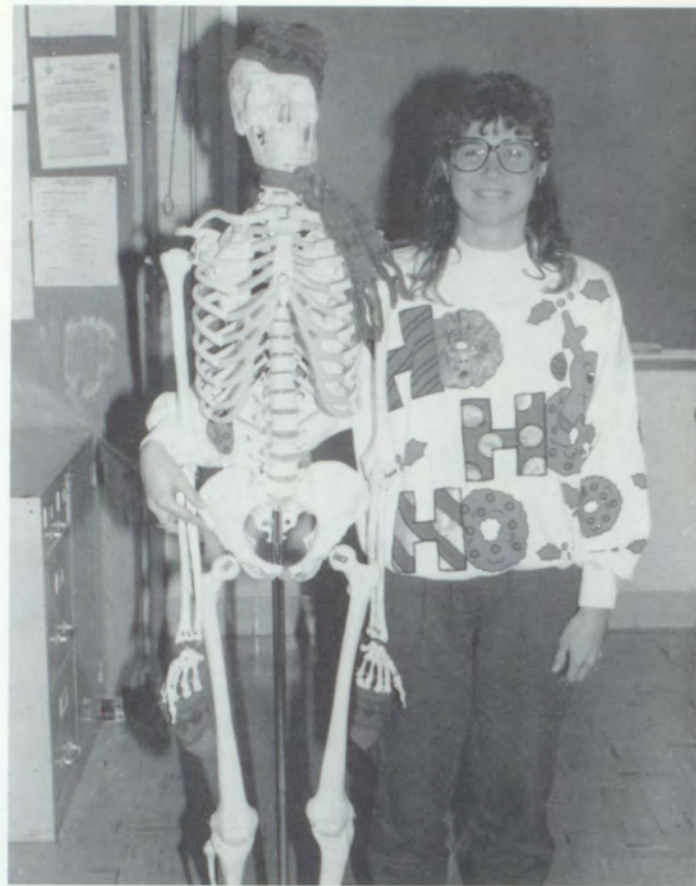

"This was our first year to attend so I feel two second places are pretty good," he said.

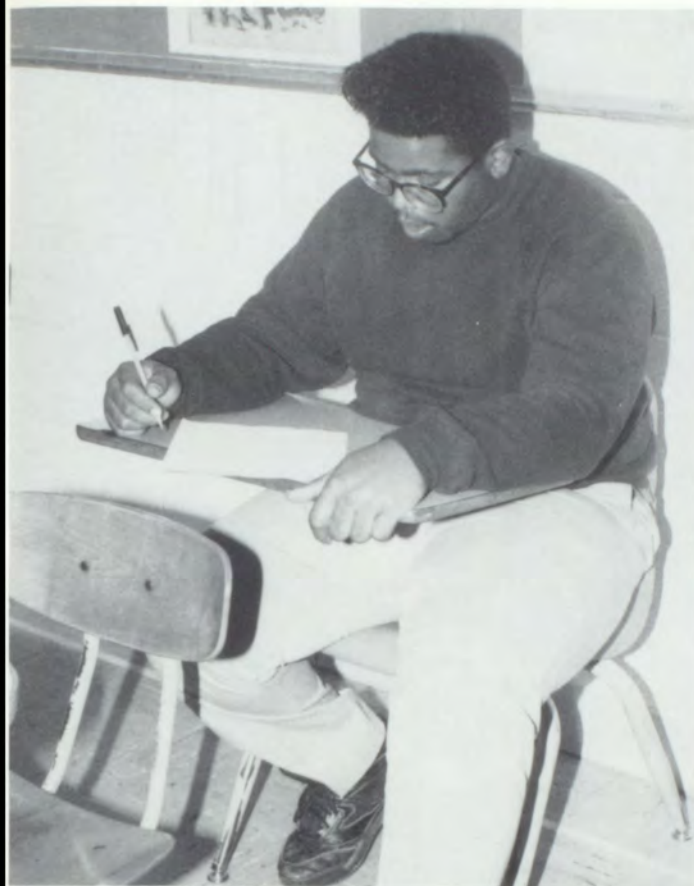

## DEBATE ENLIVENS CLASS

**9** Quite a few heated arguments recently erupted in Mrs. Shortt's speech and drama class, but there was no anger involved. The class was finishing up a unit on debate.

The twenty class members split into ten teams. A total of five debates were held, one each day from Thursday, April 15, until Wednesday, April 21.

Each debate was a team of two people in cross-examining style debating. The debaters used cross-examining questions to verify their opponents' statements.

Some students believe that the researching made them more open minded.

"After being through a debate, I

am able to see both sides of a situation and respect others opinions," Mary Bryant said.

"I was against the plan that my team had to propose for our debate," Laura Jones said. "But after researching the topic of gays in the military, I am more aware of the facts. My opinion has not changed, but I'm able to recognize that people have different opinions, and I respect their thoughts."

The class had done many projects before, but none required the accuracy of debating.

"Debate is different from anything that we had done so far this year," Mrs. Shortt said. "I felt that we had done a number of creative projects, and I wanted to try something logical. I also felt that the class had potential to produce some very good debaters."

The debates were judged using an American forensics ballot. Participants were evaluated by how well they scored on the ballot.

"Debate is hard, but it teaches you reasoning ability," Mrs. Shortt said. "It's one of the hardest things we've done this year, so the students' grades were not based on if they won or not, it was based on how they scored on the ballot."

The students felt that the debates were a good class project.

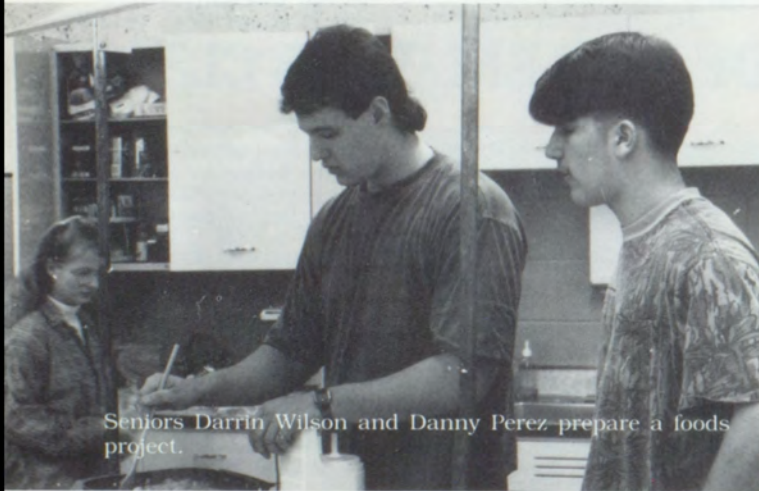
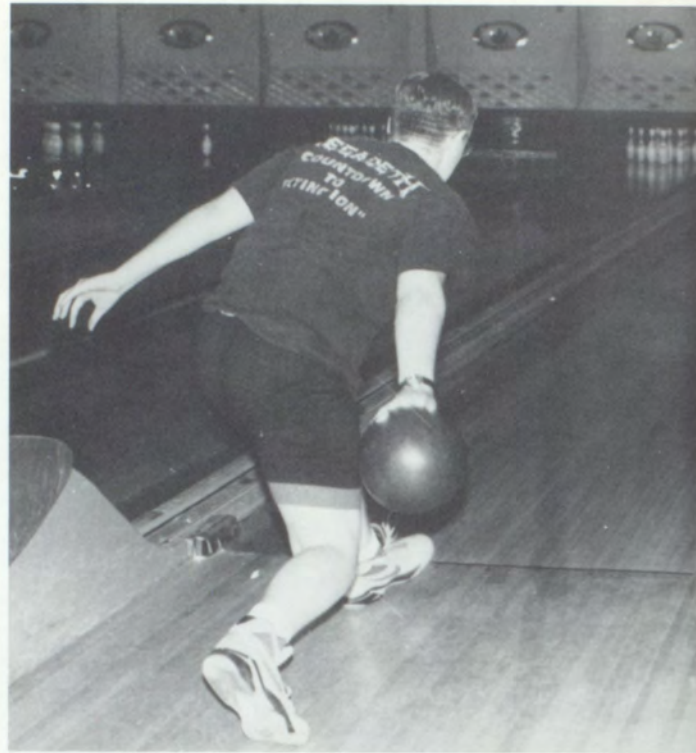
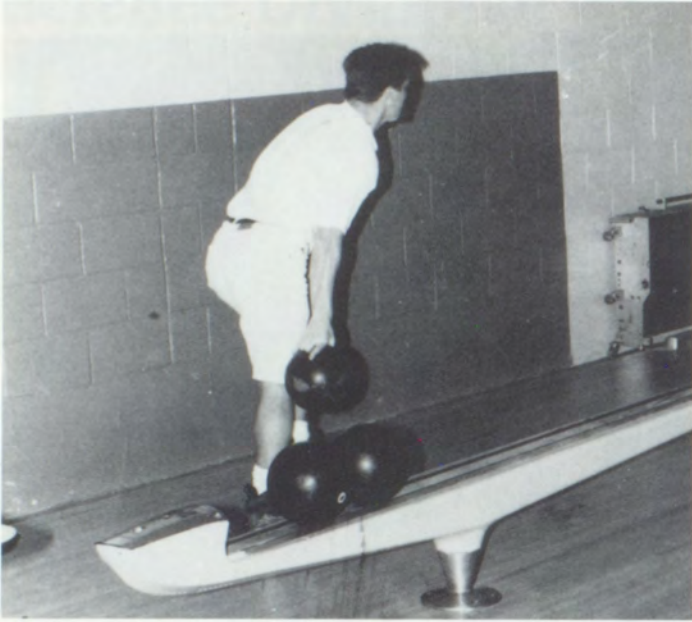
"I had fun," Jason Asquith said. "I'd like to do it again because I would know what to expect, and I could be better prepared to present my case."

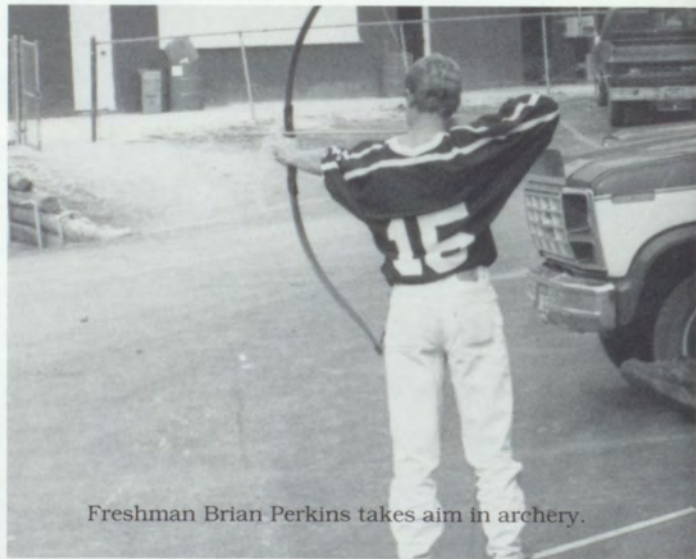

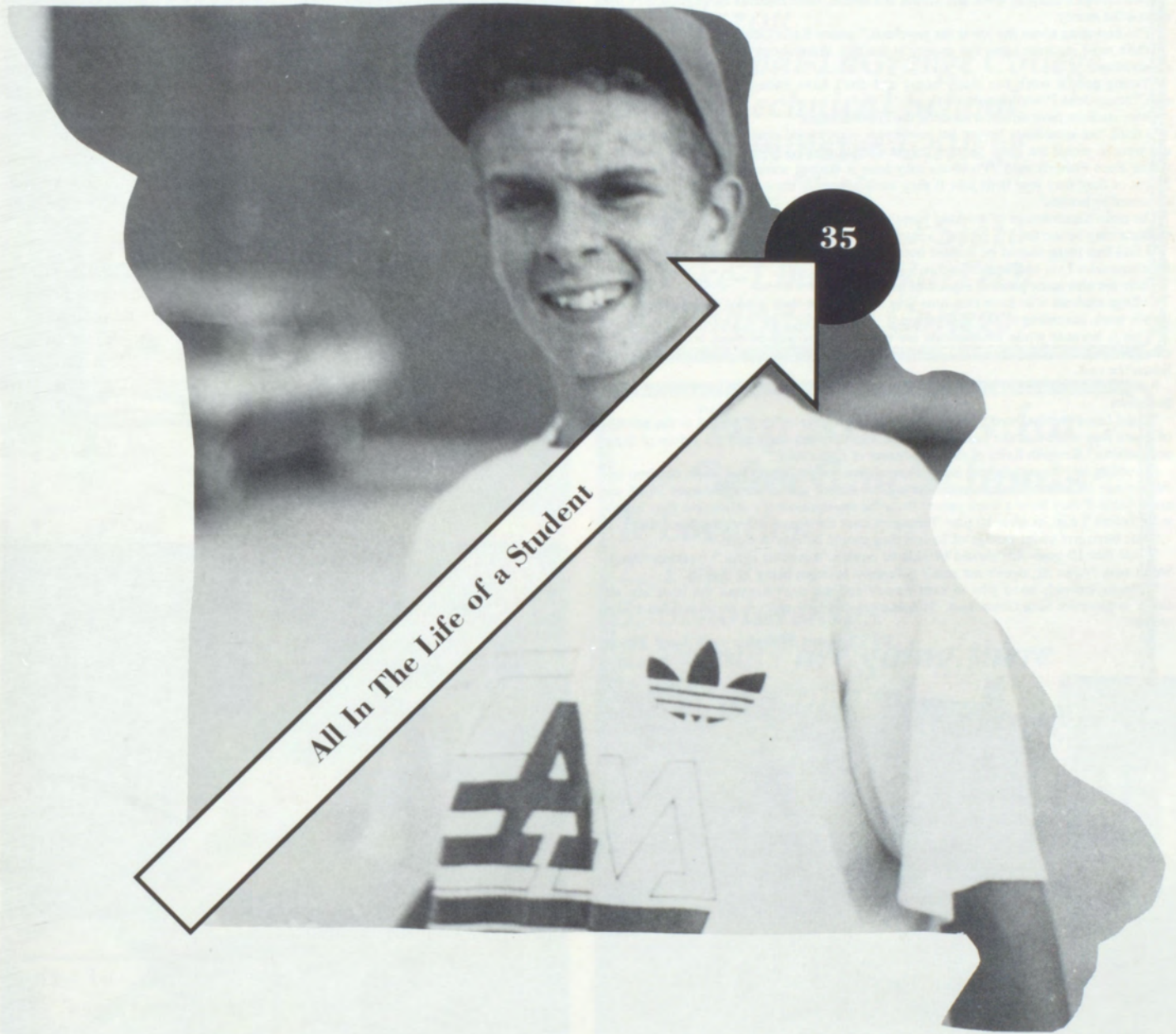
"I went because I wanted to go to a technical school," junior Chad Elliott said. "I wanted to talk to others from around the area."

## Part-time jobs are full-time headaches

If you are like some LHS students, a part-time job keeps you on the run.

"Young people work too many hours and don't have enough time to do anything else," senior John Powelson said.

Other students have different ideas on the disadvantages.

"I think that sometimes bosses put employees in awkward situations in which employees want to please the boss, but they might have to give up what is important to them," senior Reed Flaherty said. "Problems may arise if student workers feel their hours may be cut or they may lose their jobs if they can't adhere to the scheduled hours and days requested by bosses."

The main disadvantage of working part time is the fact the hours are just too long and students may be too tired to do their homework.

"I feel that there should be limited hours a child can work on a school night," guidance counselor Lyle McPherson said.

There are also some positive aspects of part-time jobs.

College students who have part-time jobs do better on their grades than students who do not work, according to Mr. McPherson.

"This is because while the students are working, they will be more responsible and can manage their time better. But I do feel that high school students work way too many hours," he said.

According to the 1939 Child Labor Laws, only children under 16 are covered under these laws.

"Child Laws are designed to protect kids under the age of 16 in regard to the number of hours they work and the kinds of occupations they can have and the safety of those occupations," Kenneth Kelly of the Department of Labor said.

According to Missouri School Board Association lawyer Mark Van Zant, children under the age of 14 are unemployable during the school year. Teenagers ages 14-16 are employable if they have a work permit from the superintendent's office, but they cannot work before 7 a.m. or after 10 p.m. Teenagers over the age of 16 can work anytime.

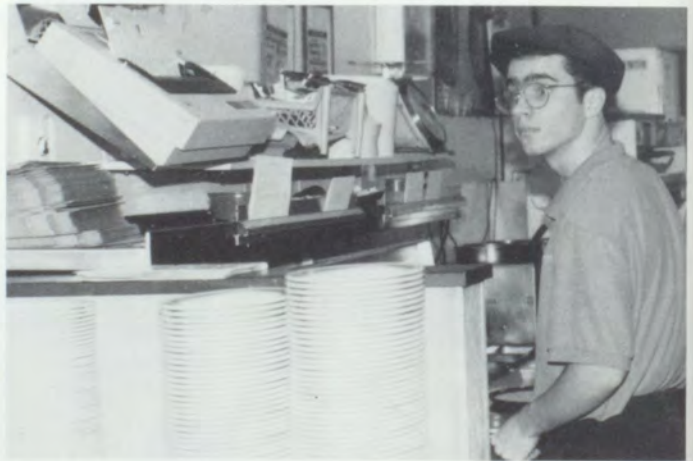
Some teenagers under the age of 16 feel they should be able to work.

"I feel that 15-year-olds should be able to work at a regular place," freshman Angie Smith said. "After all, there's not much difference between being 15 and 16."

"Fifteen-year-olds need jobs to earn money and we can't because the laws say we can't," sophomore Sara Green said. "It doesn't matter how old you are if you are a hard worker."

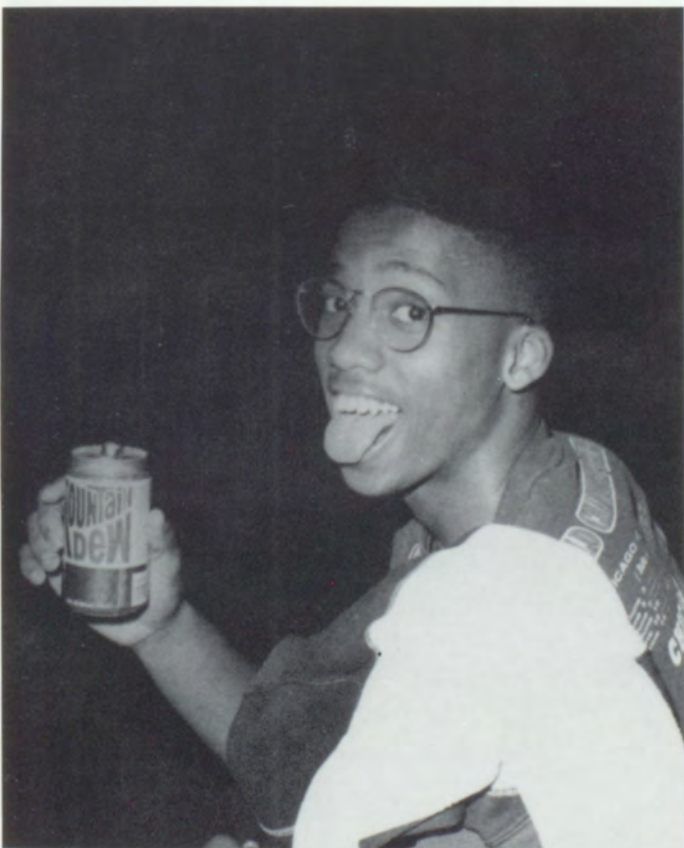

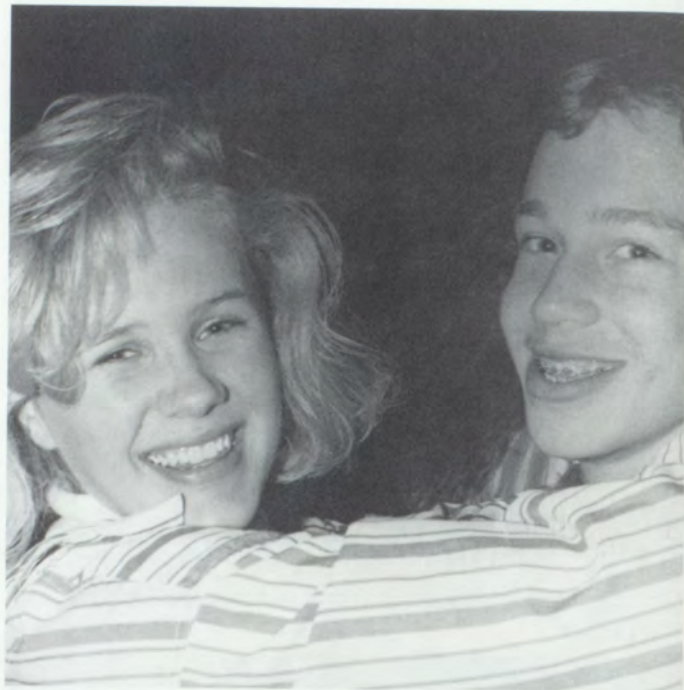

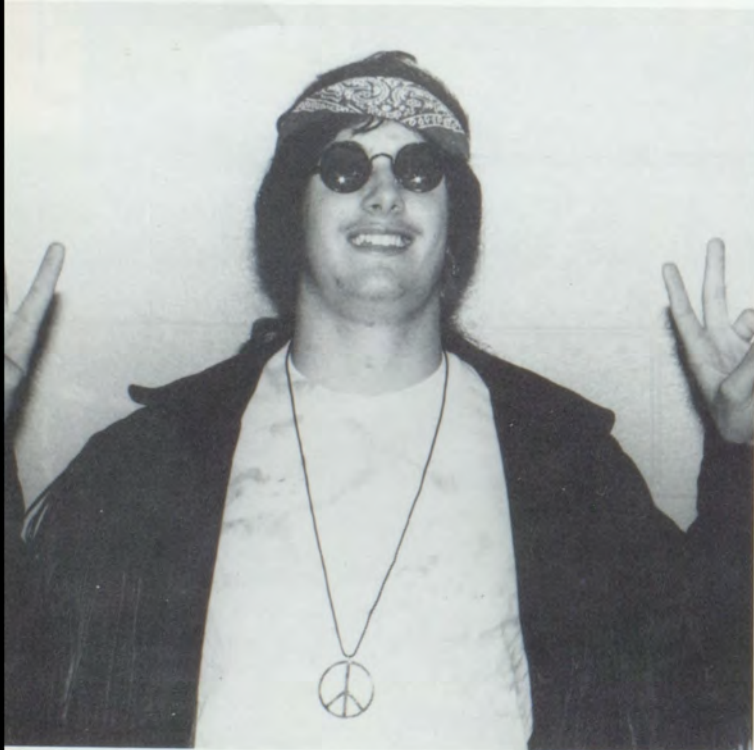

"I think Bill Clinton's views make sense," sophomore Sara Green said.

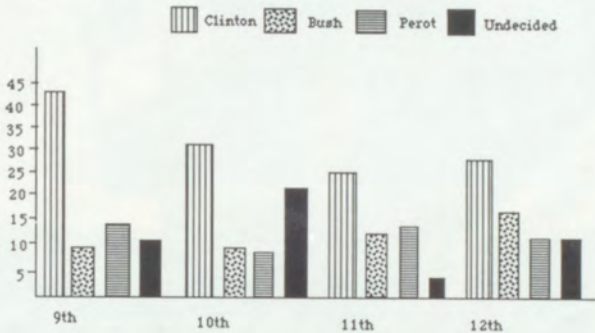
"I think Bush has learned from his mistakes on how to run the country," junior Eric Murr said. "I think he'll do better this time around."

# The votes are in.... Bond issue finally passes!

New people, new desks, new lockers, new facilities, and most importantly-new buildings. These items will soon become reality thanks to R-II voters.

At the general election held on Tuesday, April 3, the Louisiana R-II school district patrons voted for the fourth time and finally approved a proposed \$3.85 million school bond issue.

Reaction to the decision is more than favorable.

"It's the most wonderful thing to have happened to the students and faculty since I've been here!" eighth grade teacher Cyndi Bradley said.

"I think that at this point and time, it was the only decision to be made," band director Ray Henderson

said. "The community acted wisely, and I congratulate their decision."

Not only Louisiana teachers approve of the bond issue, but also the students.

"I'm happy it passed so that younger generations will get to attend a decent school," senior Chris Conleysaid.

"I think it's good because the Middle School is really dangerous," sophomore Amy Johnson said. "I glad I'll have the opportunity to end my senior year in a new school.

According to Superintendent Ono Monachino, the existing Primary School will be expanded to house grades K-4. The current high school will be remodeled and become the new middle school for grades 5-8. A

new high school for grades 9-12 will be built on the front lawn near the existing high school. Construction of these buildings will begin in the near future. The earliest date of completion will be August 1994., according to Mr. Monachino.

Three open meetings were held to get public and staff input on design and needs.

What will happen to the current Middle and Meriwether Schools?

"The buildings will not sit empty to be destroyed," Mr. Monachino said. "They will be put on the market."

Possibilities for usage of the buildings are meeting halls, office buildings, or a YMCA., according to Mr. Monachino.

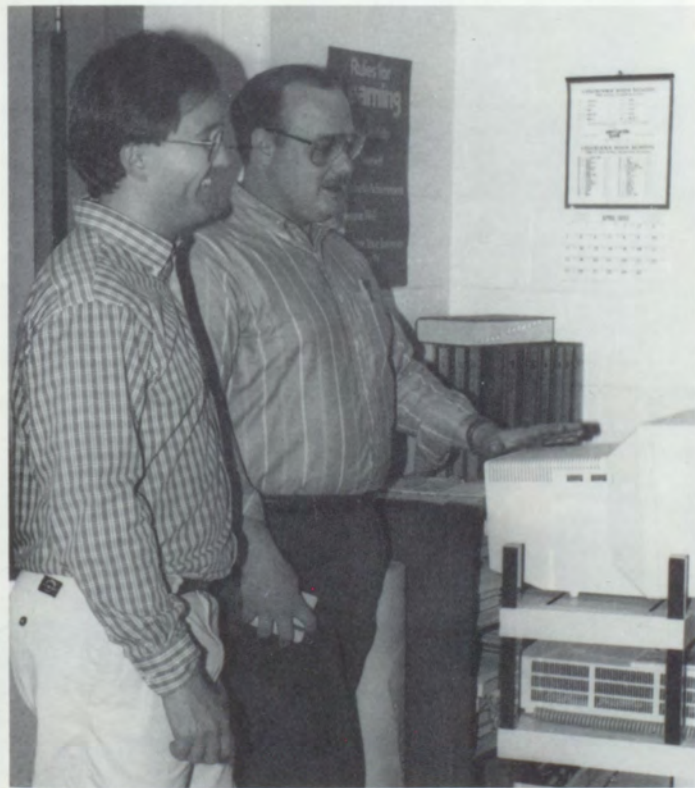

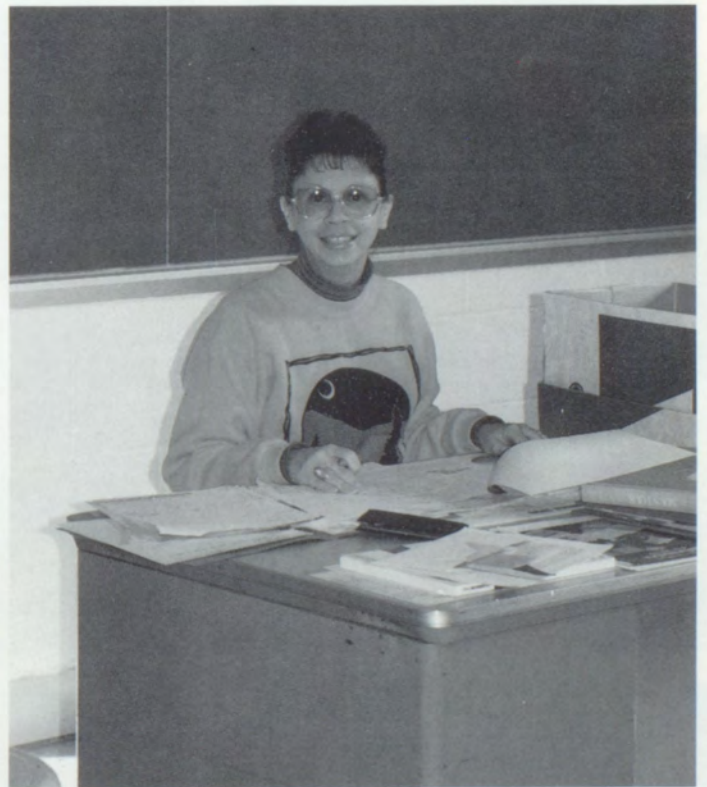

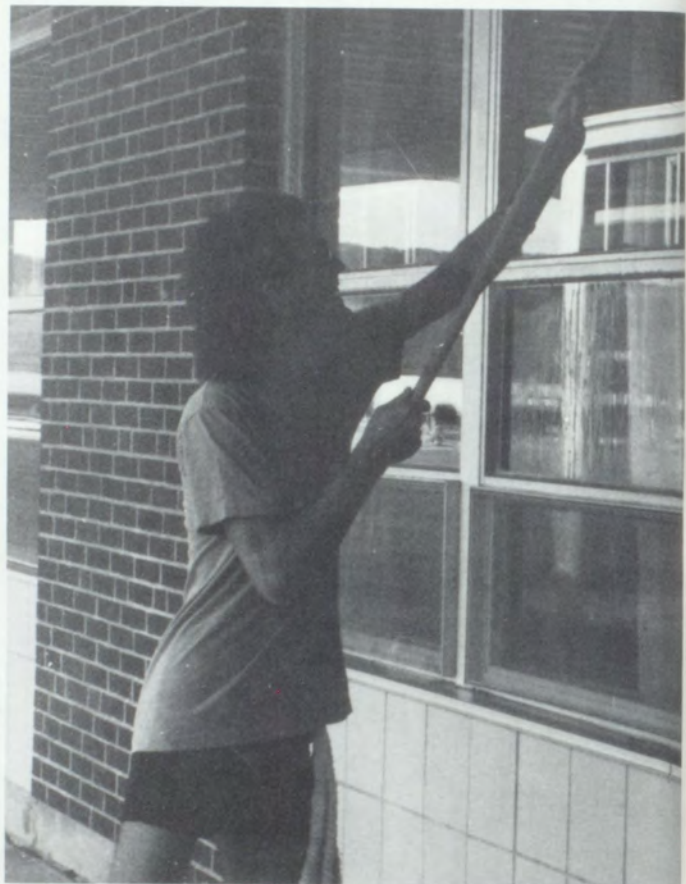

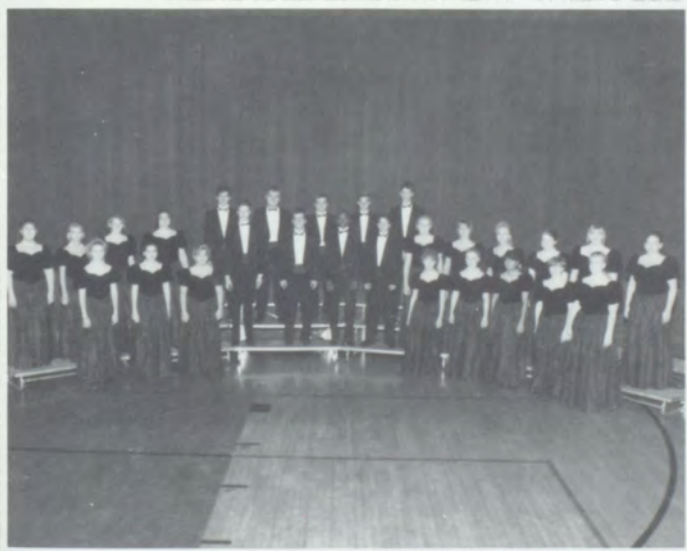

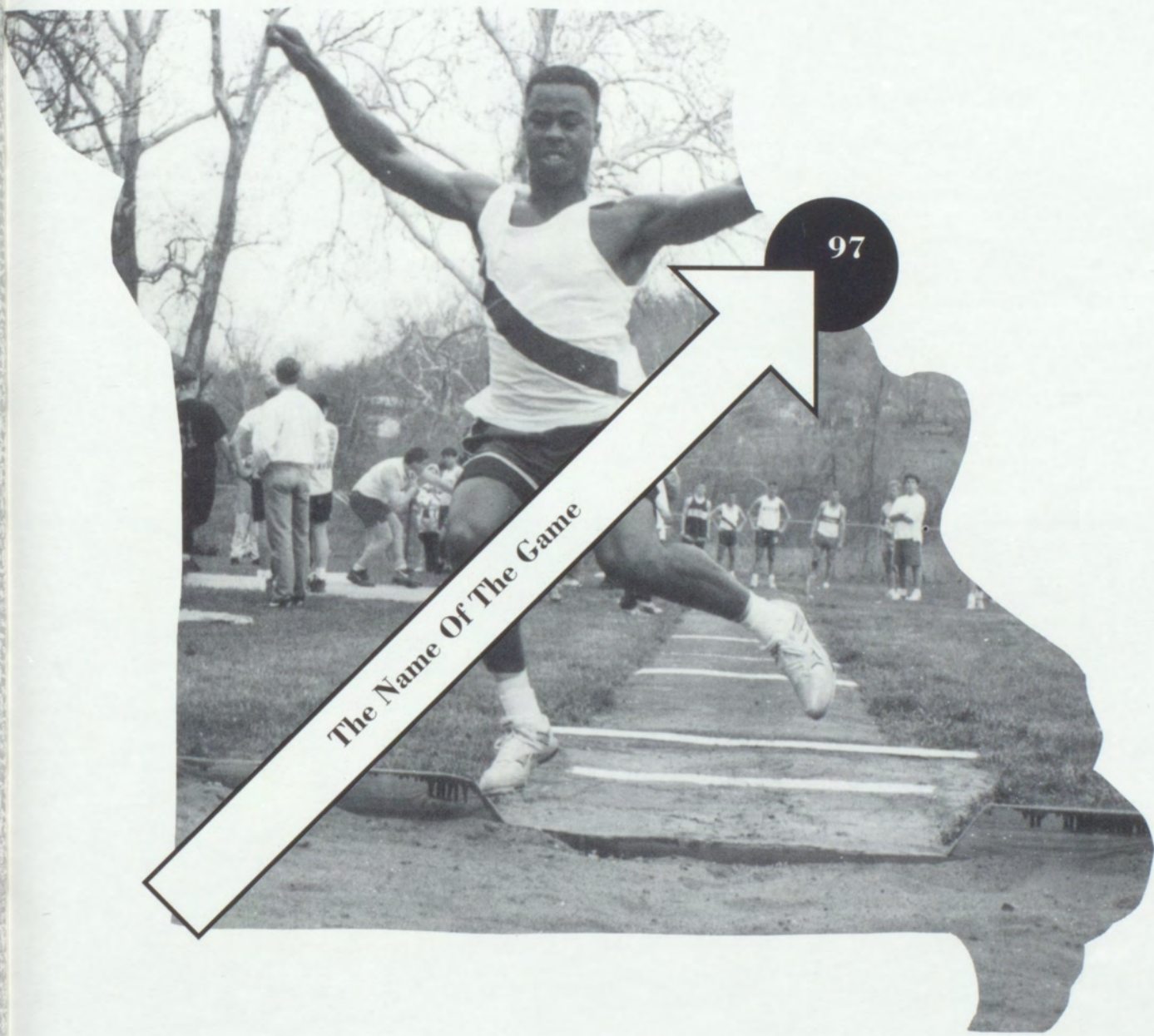

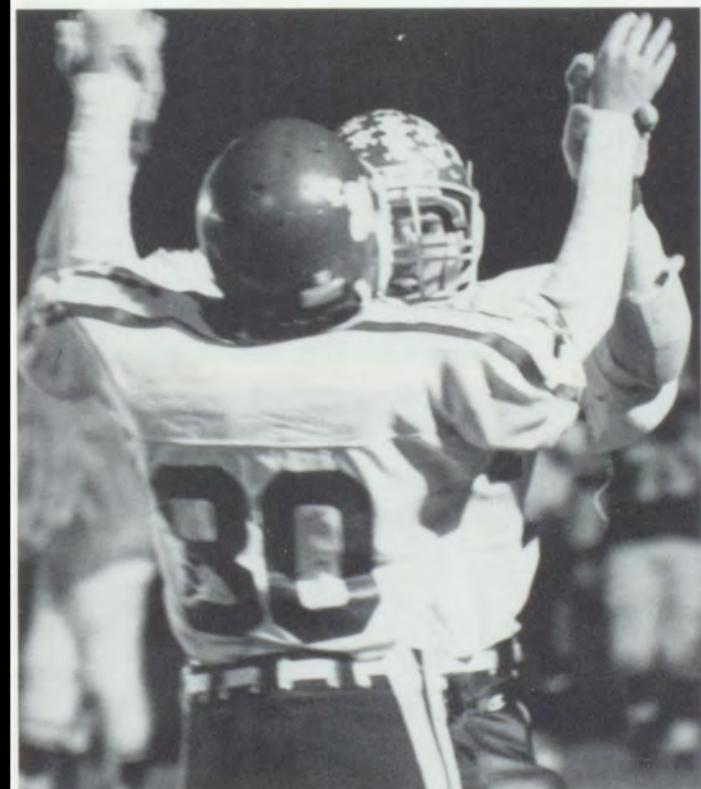
"We spend all summer getting worked up," senior tri-captain Mike Anderson said. "Beating Bowling Green is the main goal."

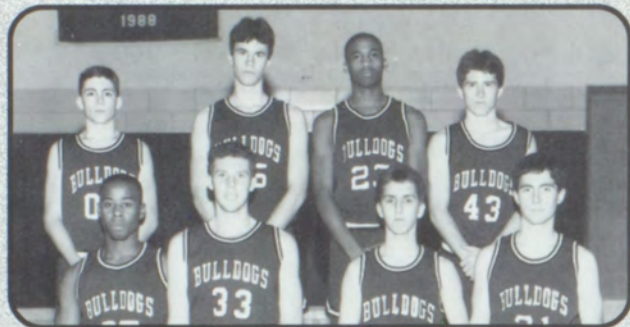

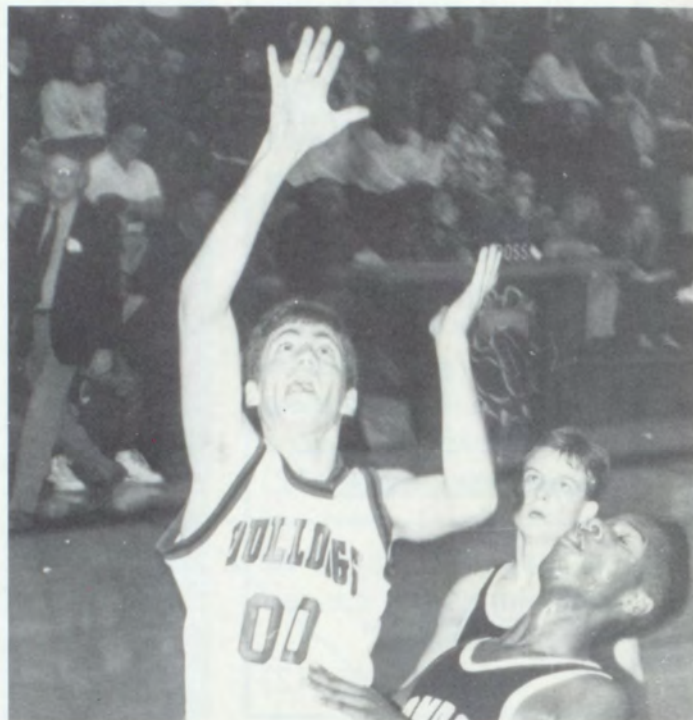

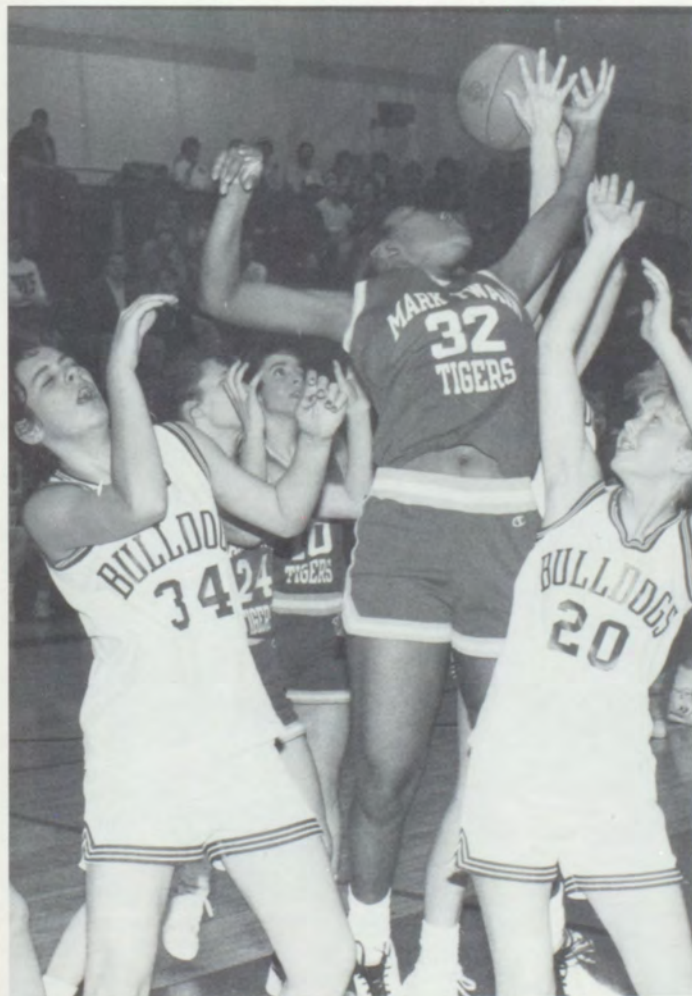

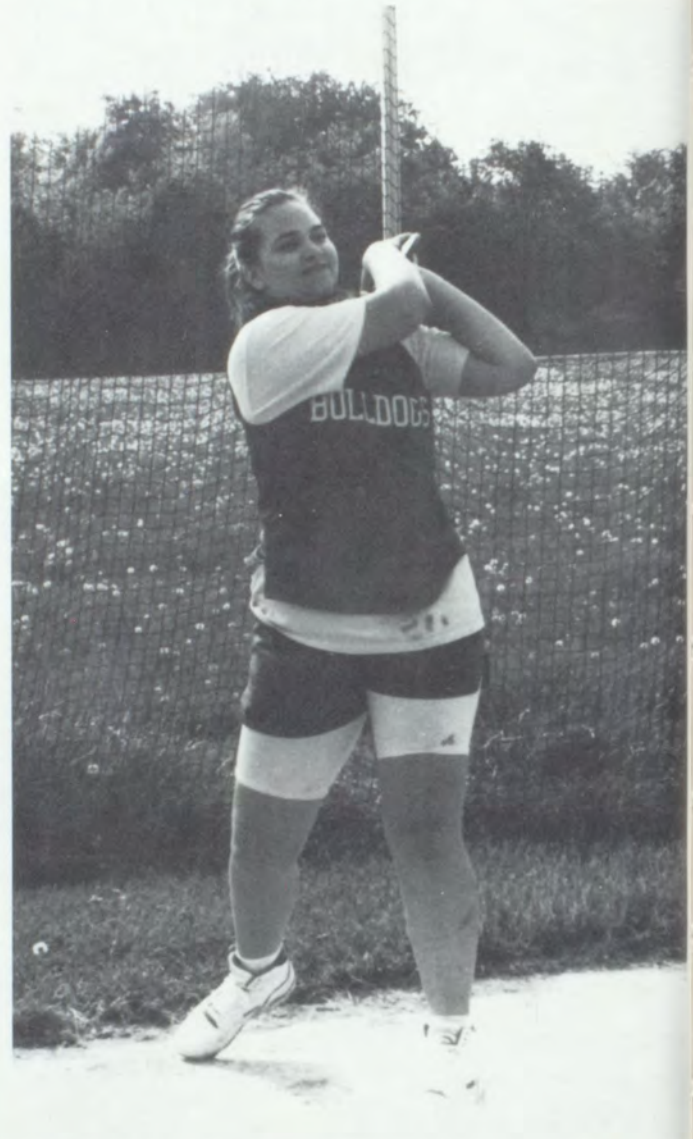

Although this year's record wasn't as good as in the past, the team seemed to steadily improve throughout the season.

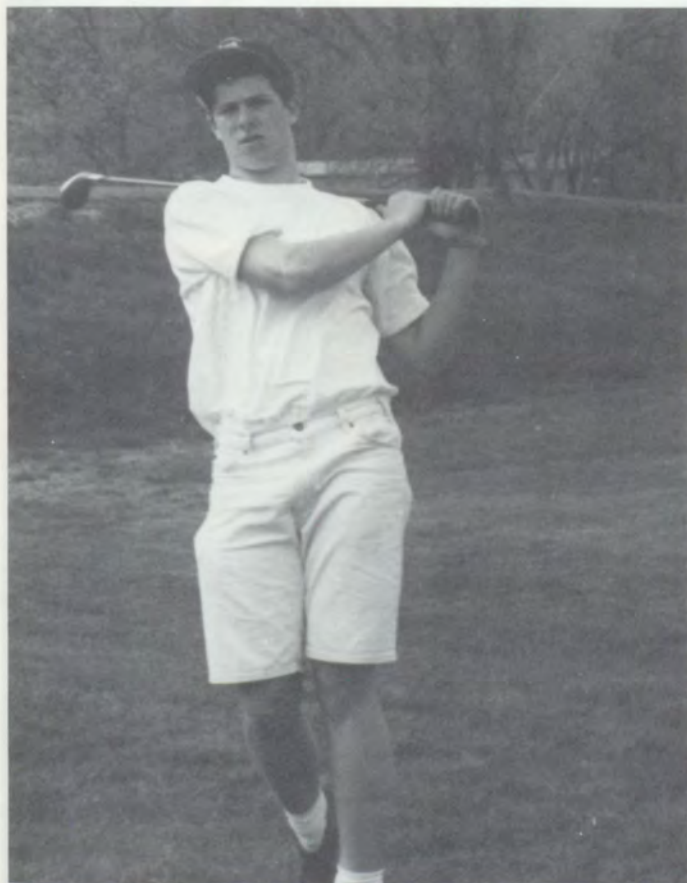
"When we finally got some rounds in, we improved a great deal," Miller said.

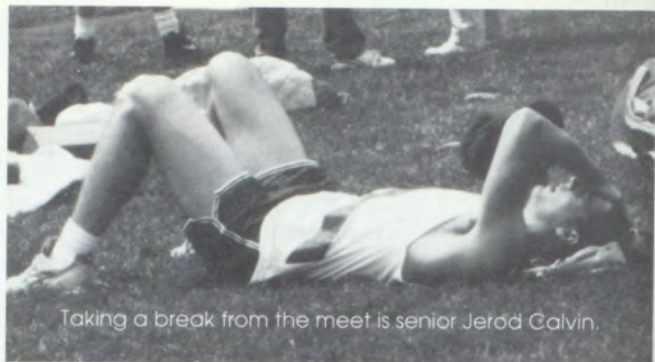

The 1993 *Alamo*, "It's All In the Name," was published by Walsworth Publishing Company, Marceline, Missouri.

The 149-page book, with dimensions of 7 3/4" by 10 1/2", includes custom-drawn division pages, dividing the book into seven sections. One hundred seventy-five books were printed and sold at \$19 each with an additional \$2 for personalization.

During a brainstorming session, the Mass Media staff selected the cover design and theme. The cover background is white with computer-generated color names of all students and faculty at LHS. Additional 4-color artwork was done by senior Sara White. The arrow extends from the back cover of the book, across the binding, to the front cover.

Typefaces selected were Avant Garde (People, Activities, Sports), Bookman (Student Life, Academics, and Organizations), Adobe Garamond (Advertising), and Bodoni (cover, opening, division pages, closing, endsheets, and folios).

Body copy was set in 10 point with a 24-point drop letter. Captions were in 8 point with an 18-point drop letter. Irish green spot color was used on pages 65, 68-69, 72-73, 76-77, and 80 of the senior section. The other pages of the senior section were done in four-color.

The following assisted in production of the yearbook: Mrs. Joy Cleaver, adviser; Mr. Dennis Griffin, principal; and Dave Rieck, Walsworth representative.

With it "all being in the name," it was obvious that the students at LHS were constantly kept busy. One of the busiest group of students had to be the Mass Media staff.

This year the staff produced a 149-page *Alamo* and 17 bimonthly issues of the *LHS Highlights*.

Finding time to work, participate in sports, be in Mass Media, study, and also have a social life could often be hard to do, but these dedicated students made it.

Not only did the class

do things for the paper or yearbook, but we also entered contests.

Jennifer Fountain received "I" ratings in editorial and feature writing at contest and Reed Flaherty received a "I" rating in news writing. He also had his poem "Teachers" published in a statewide magazine. Photographer Michael O'Shea entered photo contests as well.

The name "Hard Work" said it all in Mass Media!
