# Uncovering the news....

**T**he summer ended with the waters receding from the Great Flood of '93. Now instead of being "underwater," the citizens of Louisiana found themselves "under" the mud and debris left behind.

It took the greater part of the year to repair the hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of damage done. Work is still continuing in some areas.

The school year hadn't even begun when the tragic death of senior Chad Elliott in a motorcycle accident shocked the entire community. Although the loss was hard for the senior class to accept, they uncovered friendships and respect for one another and for the first time in four years, they pulled together as one class. The class established an annual hunting contest in memory of their classmate. The first recipient of the award was junior Bryan Oliver.

When school finally began, we were greeted by a new principal, Dan Johnson. A former law enforcement officer, Mr. Johnson "uncovered" a whole new set of rules, including no parking on the

blacktop, Saturday detention, and he put a stop to the many-year tradition of trashing the front lawn for Homecoming.

STUCO members welcomed new sponsors, Cindy Logan and Tracy Owens, when Mr. David Hunter retired from STUCO, giving up his throne after many, many years.

A new sport was uncovered this year, as spring baseball slid into LA. Thanks to interested parents who helped solicit over \$8,000 in donations to purchase uniforms and equipment, the program got off the ground. The money will support the team for three years, after which time, the team will be turned over to the school.

Instead of starting the year with one foreign student, we started out with two. Oscar Groot from Holland was sponsored by the Rotary Club. Neda Aschbach was an out-of-district (WAY out-of-district!) student from Germany. Neda's father Fritz had graduated from LHS in 1969 as a foreign student and wished his daughter to have a similar experience.

In the fall of '93 talent was uncovered when junior Hilari Ditch

became the first girl from LHS to be selected for state choir. Not only was Hilari the first from LHS, she also placed first in northeast Missouri sopranos.

During the winter FTA, Key Club, and STUCO sponsored variety projects to benefit the needy in the community.

On the national front, justice seemed to have gone awry this year with the court cases of the Menendez brothers and Lorena Bobbitt. Superstar Michael Jackson came under close scrutiny for allegations of sexual abuse. A multi-million dollar out-of-court settlement ended the case, but not the whispers.

Nancy Kerrigan and Tonya Harding were prominent in the news, and not just for their skating. Harding finally pled guilty to conspiracy to harm Kerrigan during the national championships, but both went on to the Olympics in Norway. Harding did poorly (but most viewers didn't mind), but Kerrigan captured the silver medal, losing to Oksana Baiul of the Ukraine.

year with the billion dollar fires in California, followed shortly after by a 6.7 earthquake hitting the southern California area.

Manmade disasters hit the news, too. When the FBI invaded the Branch Davidian compound in Waco, Texas, nearly 80 people died. The World Trade Center in New York was bombed by terrorists, killing six, and removing the sense of complacency and safety that Americans had formerly felt.

On the foreign front, we didn't fare well, either. Military involvements in Somalia and Bosnia caused many to question the foreign policy goals of the administration.

South Africa hit the news in the spring as blacks finally won the right to rule their country. Nelson Mandela was elected president.

Struggles for power in countries all over the globe, including Russia, were constantly in the news.

June 6, 1994, was the 50th anniversary of the D-Day invasion of Europe during World War II. Celebrations marked the occasion.

Notable deaths this year included former president Richard M. Nixon and former first lady Jacqueline

Kennedy Onassis.

In sports news, Michael Jordan surprised everyone by retiring from the Chicago Bulls, then surprised everyone even more by trying out for and making a AA team of the Chicago White Sox.

Two national sporting events will catch attention in the summer of '94. The Olympic Festival in St. Louis is expected to attract large crowds. The multi-city World Cup Soccer finals are also expected to draw major media and fan attention.

A big debate nationally was the feasibility of national health care. A big debate locally was whether or not to allow a riverboat for gambling on the riverfront. A margin of only 105 votes defeated the issue in a June election, but supporters of the boat issue vowed to continue the fight.

The May 10 annular eclipse of the sun and moon drew attention nationwide, as well as at LHS. Students, faculty, and administration gathered outside to witness this phenomenon. It hadn't been seen for ages, and won't be seen again until

2012.

At LHS we expected to "uncover" major construction, but that wasn't the case. Due to cost predictions/actualities, the Board of Education continued to work with the architect throughout much of the year. Actual construction will begin sometime the summer of '94, hopefully.

Other notable occurrences this year were concert choir's "I" rating; we actually had a spring break, instead of just a spring "pause"; the juniors put on "The Phantom of the Opera" for Prom in May; the seniors got to vote for the first time, helping to put Bill Wunderlich in the office of mayor; after 20 years, Mrs. Imogene Behringer retired from the business department; the Hardin Scholarship gave out \$102,000 over the next four years to 19 graduates of 1994; and the seniors broke tradition by asking for a third speaker at graduation. Mr. Dennis Griffith, past principal at LHS, spoke to the 48 graduating seniors.

Yes, 1993-'94 was a year to be remembered...

# Midwest flood will always be remembered

**T**he summer of '93 was the summer that pulled the Midwest states together. What caused the people to pitch in and lend a helping hand? The Great Flood of '93.

This great disaster made headlines in newspapers and covers of magazines all across the nation. It proved to be the worst flood in decades...even worse than the flood of '73.

According to July and August issues of *Time* magazine, during the flood 23 people were killed. At least 40 people were killed in the flood and over 22,000 homes were evacuated. Thirteen and a half million acres of land were immersed, and there was an estimated 10 billion dollars in damage.

What caused it? Heavier than normal rainfalls played a major part. Over eight states experienced 10 times their normal rainfall for two months. As a result, this year's flood rose to soaring heights when the Mississippi River reached a flood stage of 28.35 feet in July (as reported by the *Louisiana Press Journal*). The previous record was 27.05 feet in April of 1973.

The results of this year's flood were devastating, not only to Illinois and Iowa, but to Missouri as well. The city of Louisiana was no exception.

"The flood rose over our levee and went into our crops," sophomore Missy Love said. "We had over 600 acres-now we have 23 left. It ruined everything in its path. The water was so high we took boats out onto Highway 79 to get to my grandparents' house. We had to supply everything for them because they were stuck at home with no way to get to town."

Senior Aimee Preston's family was affected as well.

"We had ten acres of land under water and we weren't able to farm, rent out our boat docks, or rent out our land for camping," she said.

Land wasn't the only thing ruined in the flood.

"We had approximately four feet of water in the lower levee of our house. My family had to move to an apartment," freshman Dawn Lucas said.

With water over many of the busy streets and highways in Missouri and Illinois, traffic was restricted. Some people weren't even able to use their vehicles to get around.

"We couldn't get to my house by car," junior Brook Sisco said. "We had to take a boat to our house for three months. Some of the deepest parts on our road were nine feet deep."

People who were able to get around by vehicle had to travel rough terrain.

"The road to Hannibal was flooded and sometimes the road to Louisiana was flooded, so we had to take gravel roads to get anywhere," junior Leslie Barton said.

Getting to work was a rough ride for some.

Sophomore Lisa Wharton's father works at Aqualon.

"I had to drive an estimated 10 minutes longer because of the roughness of the gravel roads I had to take," he said.

Not only did the mighty flood affect student and their parents, many businesses suffered, too.

No one knows what long term effects the Midwest states will suffer. Most people have mixed feelings.

"Regaining our strength and income from the lost crops will be hard, but I think we can make it through," Missy said. "Growing the crops again will be hard, but cleaning up and dealing with what happened to all of those innocent peoples' belongings (will be). I'm just glad that it was a field instead of my home."

Sadness, helplessness, and desperation were mixed with hope and many acts of kindness. The great flood will always be remembered.

## *Prom-so expensive, but worth every penny!*

**P**reparing for Prom, one of the most eventful nights of the year, doesn't happen overnight.

Finding the perfect dress or the most affordable is the first item on the list for most girls. The search starts as early as four months before the big night and some are willing to pay hundreds of dollars.

"My dress cost over \$300," senior Michelle Pitzer said.

"I spent a lot," junior Emily Harrison said. "But I think it's worth it."

According to the Eighth Avenue Villager in Quincy, Ill., prom dresses range from \$90 to whatever the shopper wants to spend. The most popular dress this year was the floor length sequined gown that started at \$300 and went to \$400. The short version began at \$200.

"I spent too much money last year," senior, Lisa Hildebrand said, "So I didn't spend as much this year."

Once the perfect dress has been found, matching shoes, jewelry, and gloves must be bought.

At the Villager sequined shoes are sold for \$65, dyed shoes were \$29-\$36, and decorated models cost \$5-\$10. Jewelry began at \$18 and was priced by the piece. A rhinestone necklace, bracelet, and earring ensemble cost approximately \$70. Gloves were the finishing touch. Long gloves were \$22, short ones were slightly less.

"It's so much easier to borrow a dress because than you don't have to spend all that money," senior Kristina Rosenburg said. "Then all you have to worry about are shoes, accessories (which can also be borrowed), and a hairstyle."

Next, appointments were made to tan, have make overs, hair styled, and manicures.

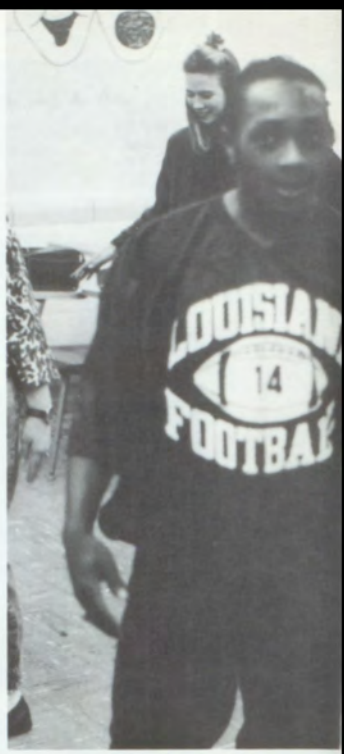

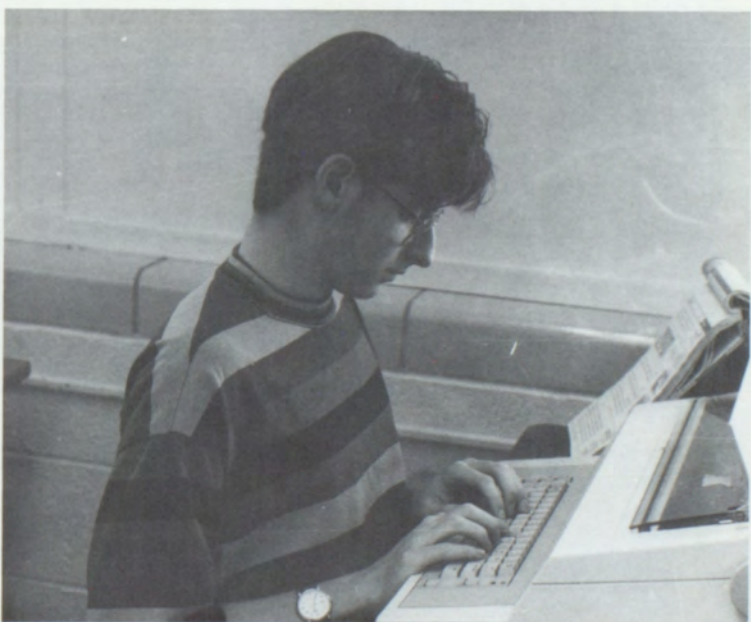

## Will they help or hurt? Band, weights, and choir affect GPA

**V**aledictorian, salutatorian, top 10% of the class—all are decided upon by grade point averages.

Starting this year, GPA's are affected for the first time by band, weights, and choir.

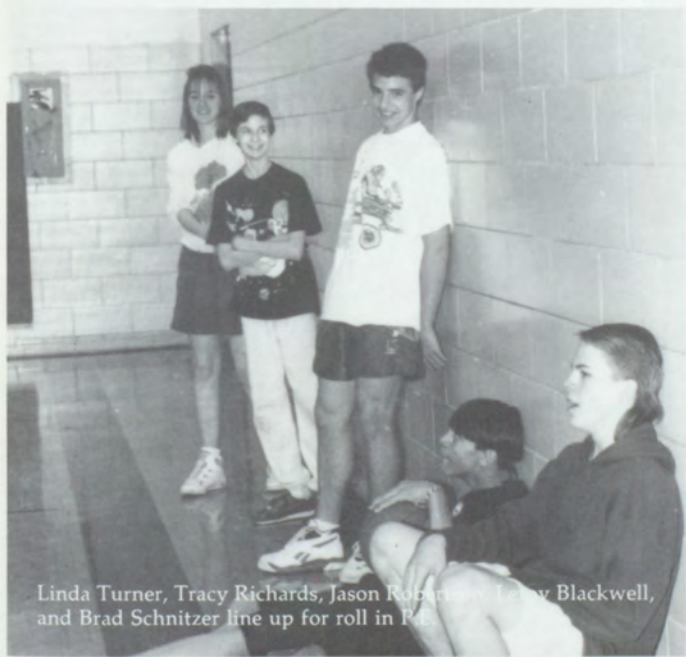

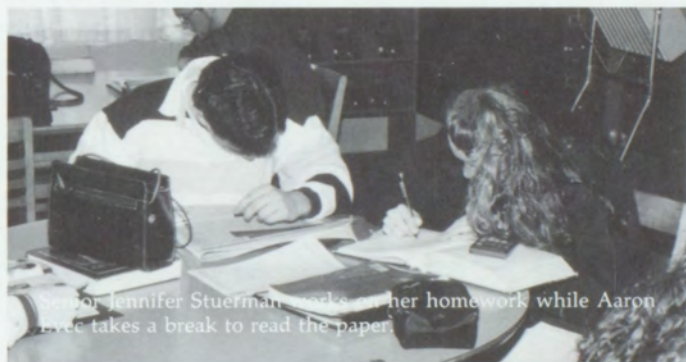

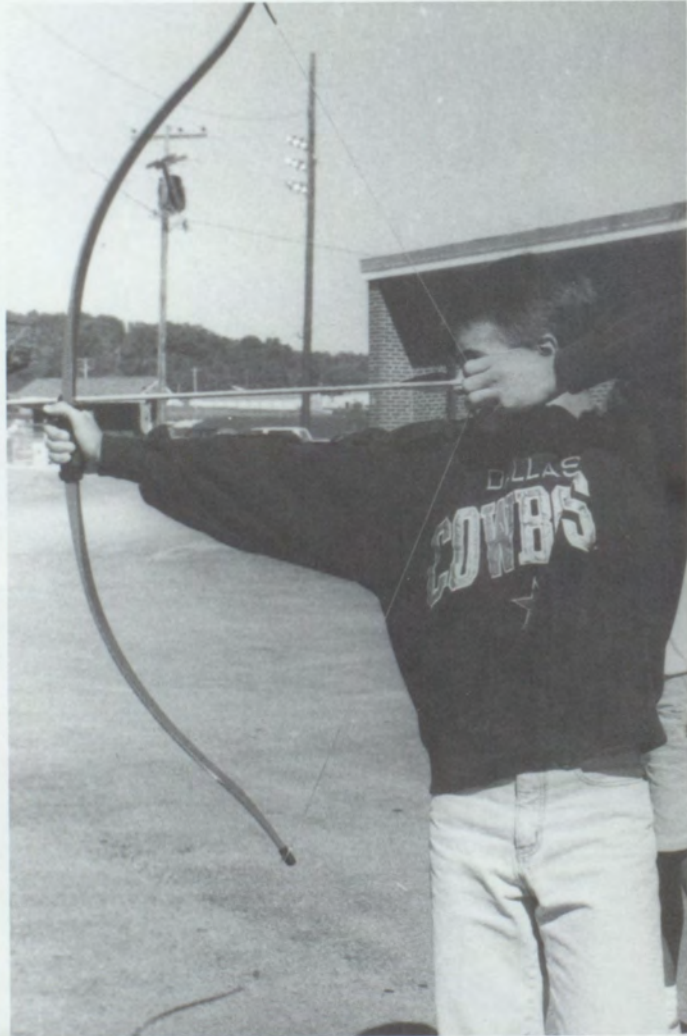

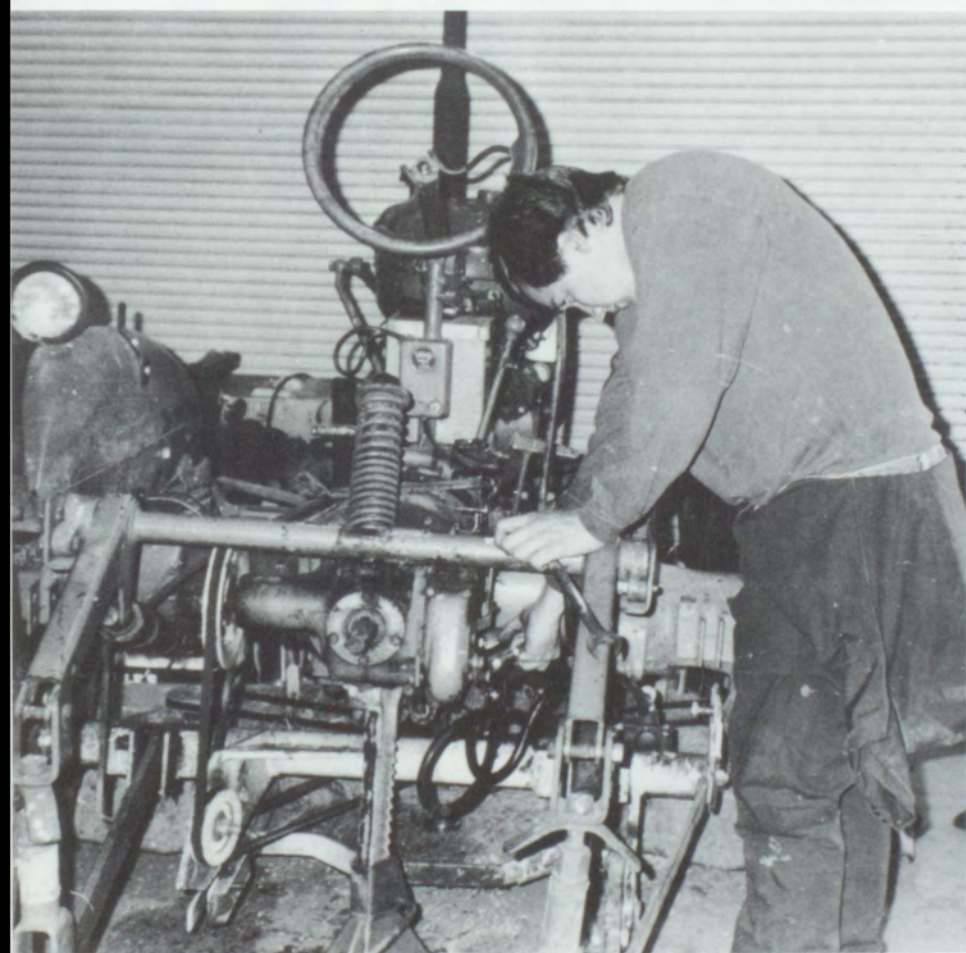

Their last game versus Mark Twain didn't go as well as Louisiana was beaten soundly, 28-48.

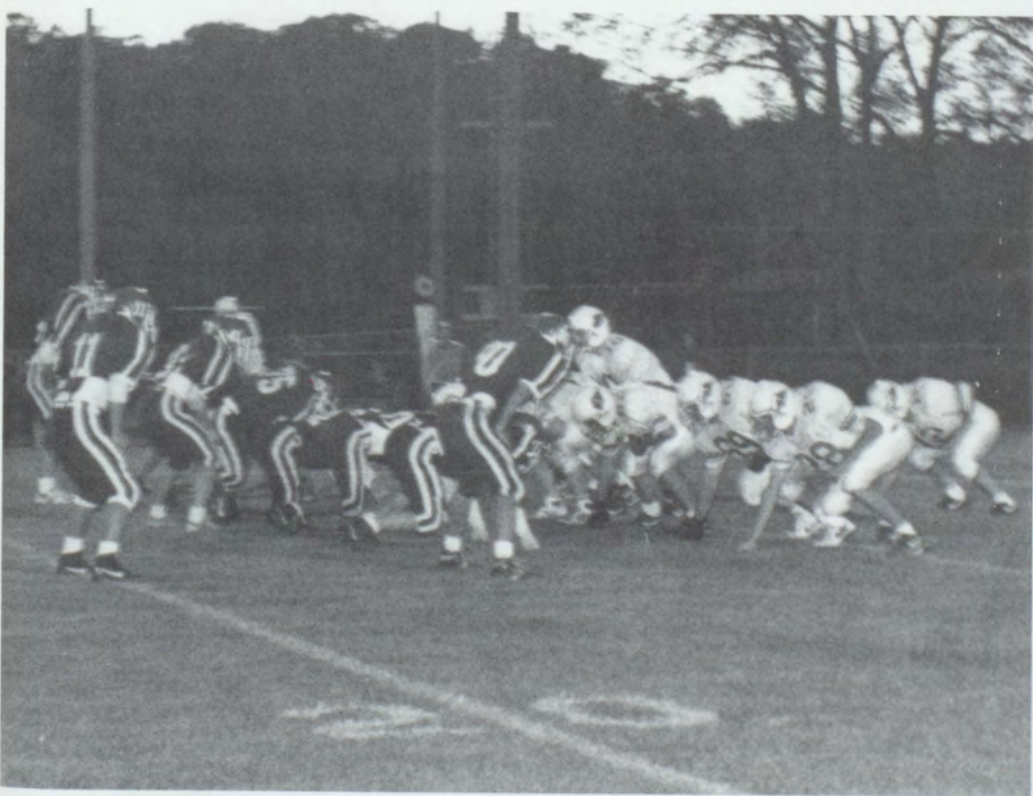
Although the season ended with a record of 4-6, the future looks bright with 21 returning lettermen for next year.

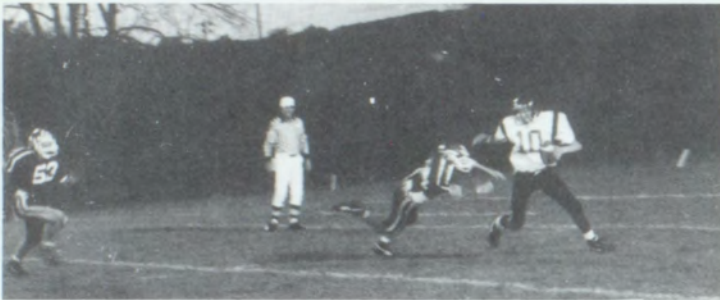

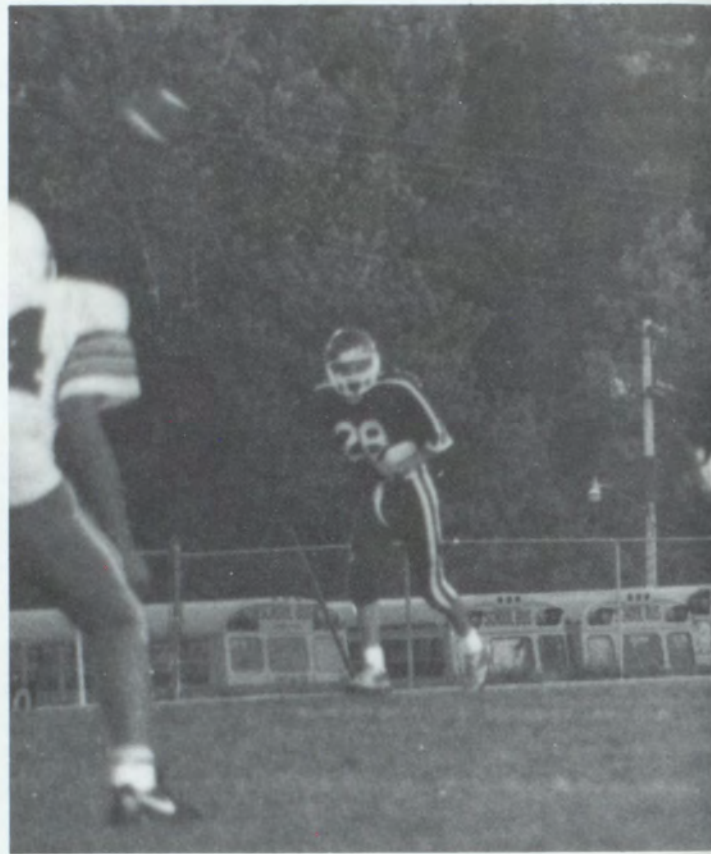

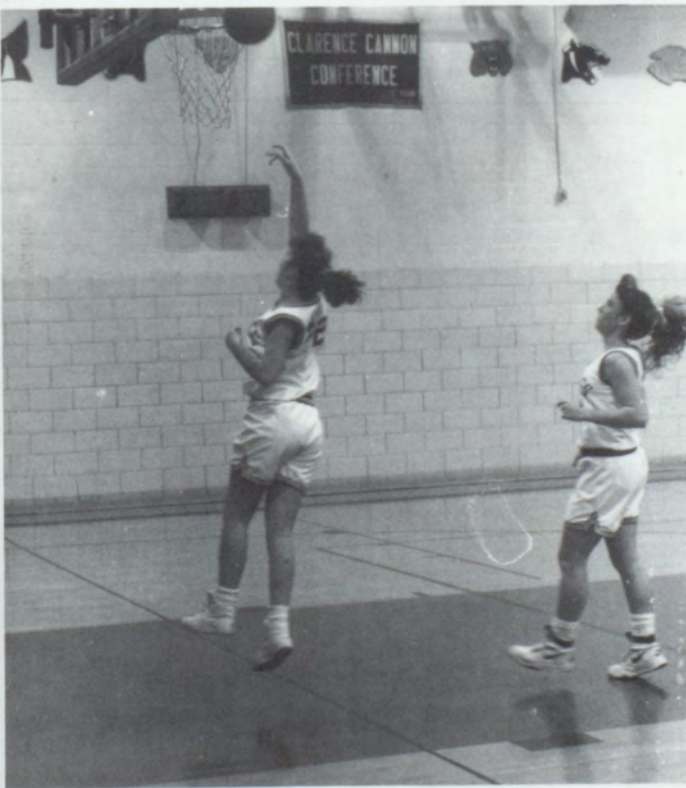

"Even though we didn't win very often, we managed to have fun. The golf season is always fun because it is a laid back atmosphere," Derrick said.

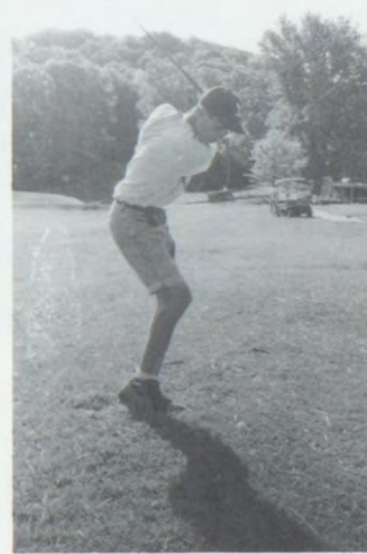

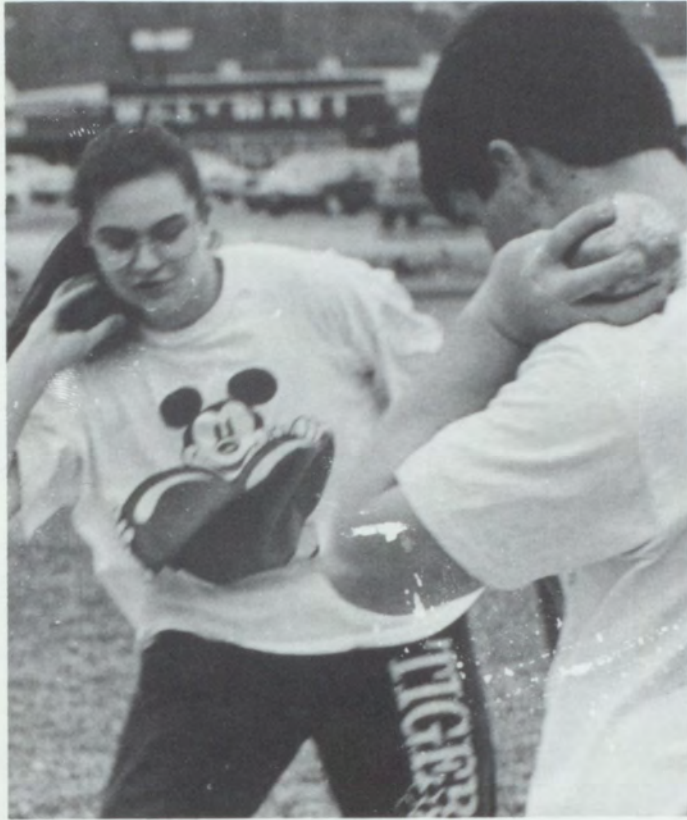

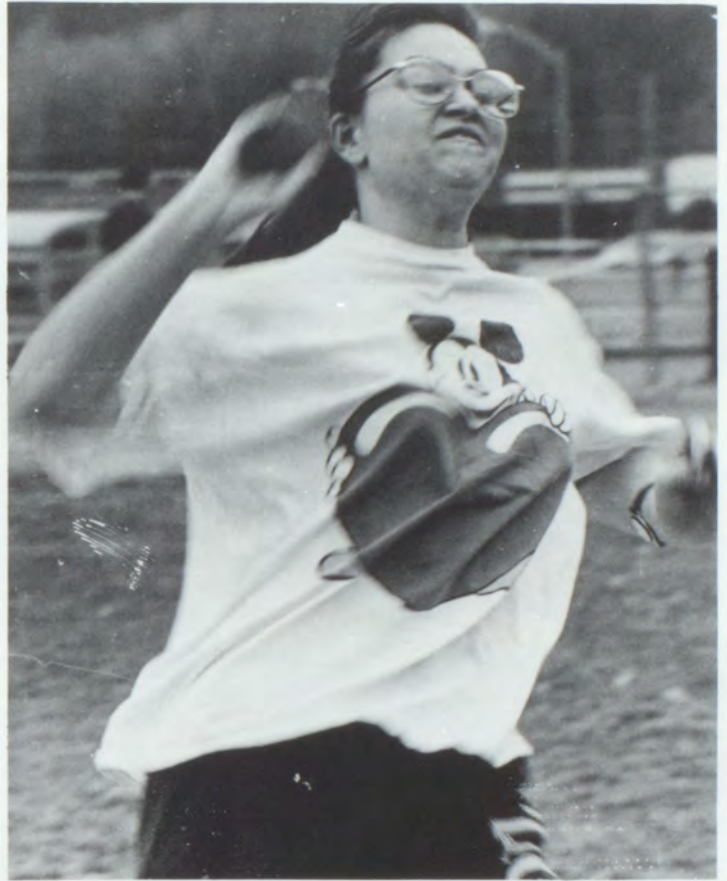

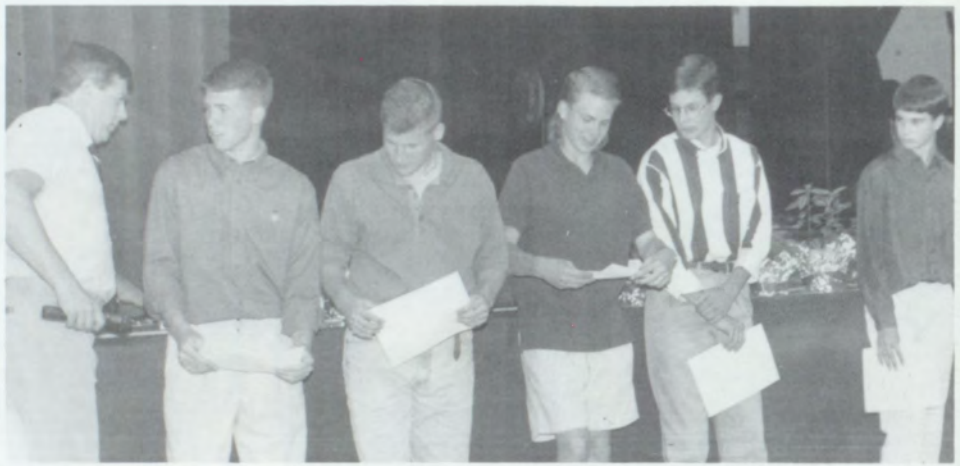

The attendance at the Colorfest was lower than usual because of all the rain.

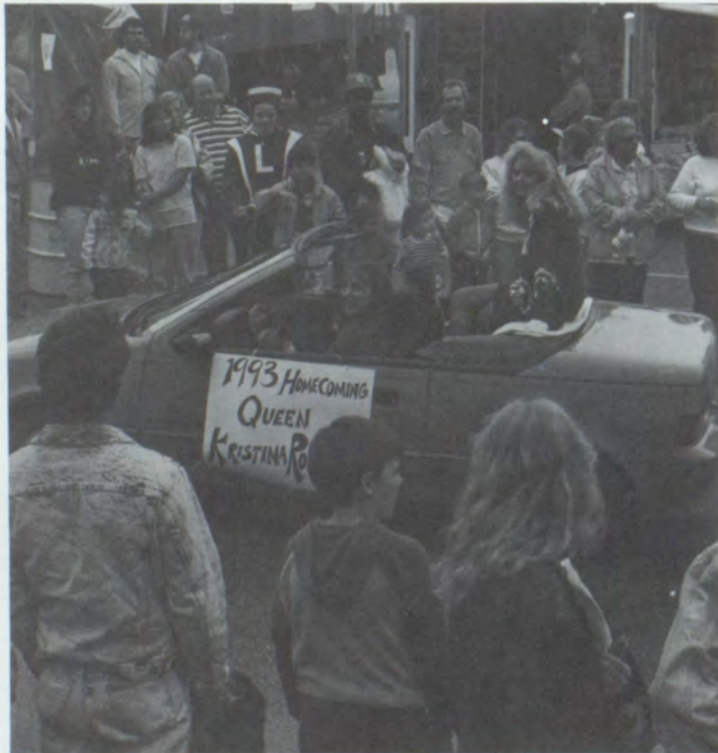
"I went for about an hour," sophomore Stacey Todd said.

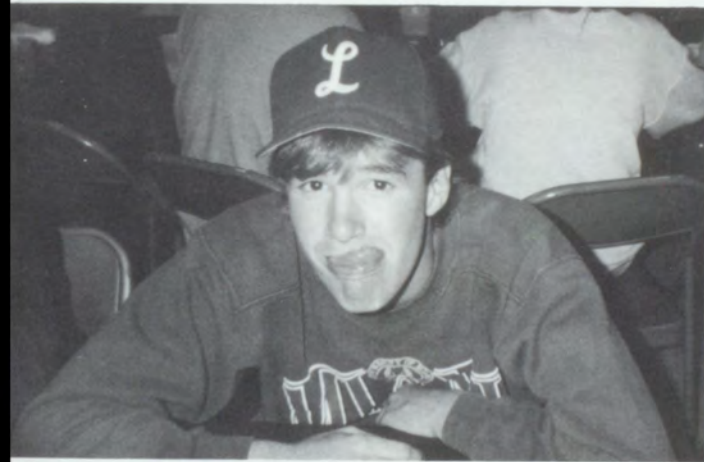

## It seems to me...

Through my 18 brief years of life, I've learned of the concept of death and accept it as best as I can. I went through (along with many others) a dramatic loss last summer when I lost a good friend of mine. I would have preferred to never have felt that kind of pain and emptiness again. But when I learned of the band Nirvana's lead singer Kurt Cobain's suicide, I relived some of those same memories and feelings once more.

Nirvana became one of America's favorite alternative bands since their rise to fame with their third LP "Nevermind." Just months before Cobain's suicide, the band's fourth album, "In Utero," was released and was an immediate success. When the band became more increasingly popular, Cobain was unable to cope with his fame and resorted to heroin. It became an addiction.

Kurt Cobain's life was not all pleasure. His parents divorced when he was young. He was given drugs as a youth for his behavioral problems and became addicted to illegal drugs as a teenager.

In 1992 Cobain married Courtney Love, lead singer of the band Hole. Months ago they had their only child, Frances Bean. Cobain's family seemed to be the cog that kept his motor running, but unfortunately they weren't enough. Weeks before his suicide, Cobain was overseas touring when he overdosed on champagne and sedatives. He successfully came out of his coma, but this incident didn't seem to change him.

Cobain was last seen alive on April 5. His wife reported him missing, but he wasn't found until April 8 in a former residence. He died from a self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head. A suicide note and other personal belongings were found nearby.

I never knew Kurt Cobain personally. I never even saw him in concert. But I seemed to relate to him as do others of the young generation. You could have called him our "spokesman". He talked to us through his music. Kurt sang of happiness, depression, pain- things that young adults can easily understand. He was a star and an idol. He was respected and loved.

Everyone is put on earth for different reasons. Kurt was given to the world to entertain. And that is what he should be remembered for, not the way he passed. He will long live in our hearts and minds.

# Uncovering talents, friends, and dedication

During their July week-long stay, the three were assigned to design a yearbook cover, theme, and division pages that could be used for the 1993-'94 yearbook. Other "assignments" included producing a marketing plan, and doing original writings.

When the week ended, LHS had walked away with first place honors

in marketing and headline copy writing and fifth place for section design and the "Sweepstakes" Award for overall participation.

When school started, the staff liked the cover and theme idea and we began to work, not only on the yearbook, but on the newspaper as well. For the second year *Highlights* editors had to do the design of the newspaper at the *Press Journal*. We also welcomed Neda Aschbach from Germany and foreign exchange student Oscar Groot from Holland.

In the spring we submitted entries to NMSU's Academic Festival. Carrie Penrod and Jennifer Browning

received a "I" rating for a story on the Brady Bill, Wendy Arttus got a "I" for her story on the flood of '93, Kim Miller and Julie Alexander received a "I" rating for their Homecoming editorial, and Aimee Preston had a "I" rating for a piece on the bond issue. Even though the *Highlights* received a "II" rating overall, we felt that the writing, photography, layout, and design had all improved.

We began the year "Undercover" because we didn't know what the future held in store for us, but we uncovered talent, dedication, and friendships that will not soon be forgotten.



## COLOPHON

The 1993-'94 *Alamo*, "Undercover," was published by Josten's Publishing Company, in Topeka, Kansas.

This 144-page book is 7 3/4" by 10 1/2". Custom-drawn thematic division pages divide the book into six sections. One hundred and seventy-five books were printed and sold at a cost of \$19 each with an additional \$3 for personalization on the cover.

The cover design and theme were selected during a Josten's summer workshop at CMSU by *Alamo* editors Aimee Preston, Carrie Penrod, and adviser Joy Cleaver. The cover colors are teal, pink, purple, and white. The recurring graphic element beginning on the cover and continuing throughout the entire book is three inner-locking shadowed boxes.

The type fonts used throughout the book were Palatino (Academics, Sports, Organizations, and Activities); Times Roman (People, and Student life, and Benguiat (Ads).

Body copy for the entire book is set in 10 point. Captions were in 8 point, beginning with an 18-point drop letter.

Royal purple spot color was used on pages 17, 20, 21, 24, 25, 28, 29, 32, 33. The other pages of the senior section were done in four-color.
